SMITHSONIAN TO FINANCE TRIP

Zoologist, Heller Gives Out New Information on Big Roosevelt Chase.

(United-Press Leased Wire.) Berkeley, Cal., Nov. 7.—President Roosevelt's African trip will be a scientific expedition, instead of a hunting outing, and the Smithsonian Institution will finance a part, if not all of it, according to the statement made today by Edmund Heller, who is to lead the party to the remote continent.

Heller is professor of vertebrate zoology at Stanford university, and is here visiting a friend. This afternoon he said to the United Press: "This is to be a scientific expedition instead of a hunting trip, as generally supposed, and according to the president's letter to me, the Smithsonian institution will have charge of all the details and will finance the trip. This is the way I understand matters. At any rate the Smithsonian will finance my part of the expedition, and I expect scientific men who have been chosen to join the party, J. Alden Loring, who is to be official historian of the trip, is a well known person, friend of the president and is a well known naturalist and writer. Dr. Meares, whom I will assist in mounting the game killed by the president and his son Kermit, is well known to the scientific world. I presume I was attached to the party because of my experience gained with two years spent in Africa for the Field museum of Chicago. I am familiar with the fauna and flora of the country."

India Snake Victims.

According to the "snake" statistics for 1907 the total mortality among human beings caused by snake bite fell from 2,811 in 1906 to 2,418 in 1907. So low a figure has not been reached since 1897. The decrease is noticeable mainly in Bengal and eastern Bengal and Assam, where the figures fell from 8,882 and 2,730 in 1906 to 3,776 and 1,900 respectively in 1907. The most important causes occurred in Madras and Burma, where the figures rose from 1,527 and 1,149 in 1906 to 1,971 and 1,600 respectively. The decrease in eastern Bengal and Assam is attributed to the floods having been lower. The central provinces figure (98) is the lowest returned in any one of the last seven years.

GUS ROGERS LEAVES VERY LARGE ESTATE

New York, Nov. 7.—Gus Rogers, the comedian, died yesterday at his home, 200 West Seventieth street. He had been confined to his bed since September 30 with typhoid fever. Intestinal hemorrhage was the immediate cause of death, according to his attending physician, Dr. Hermann Collier of 168 West 145th street. Up to last Sunday the comedian was not regarded as seriously ill.
