

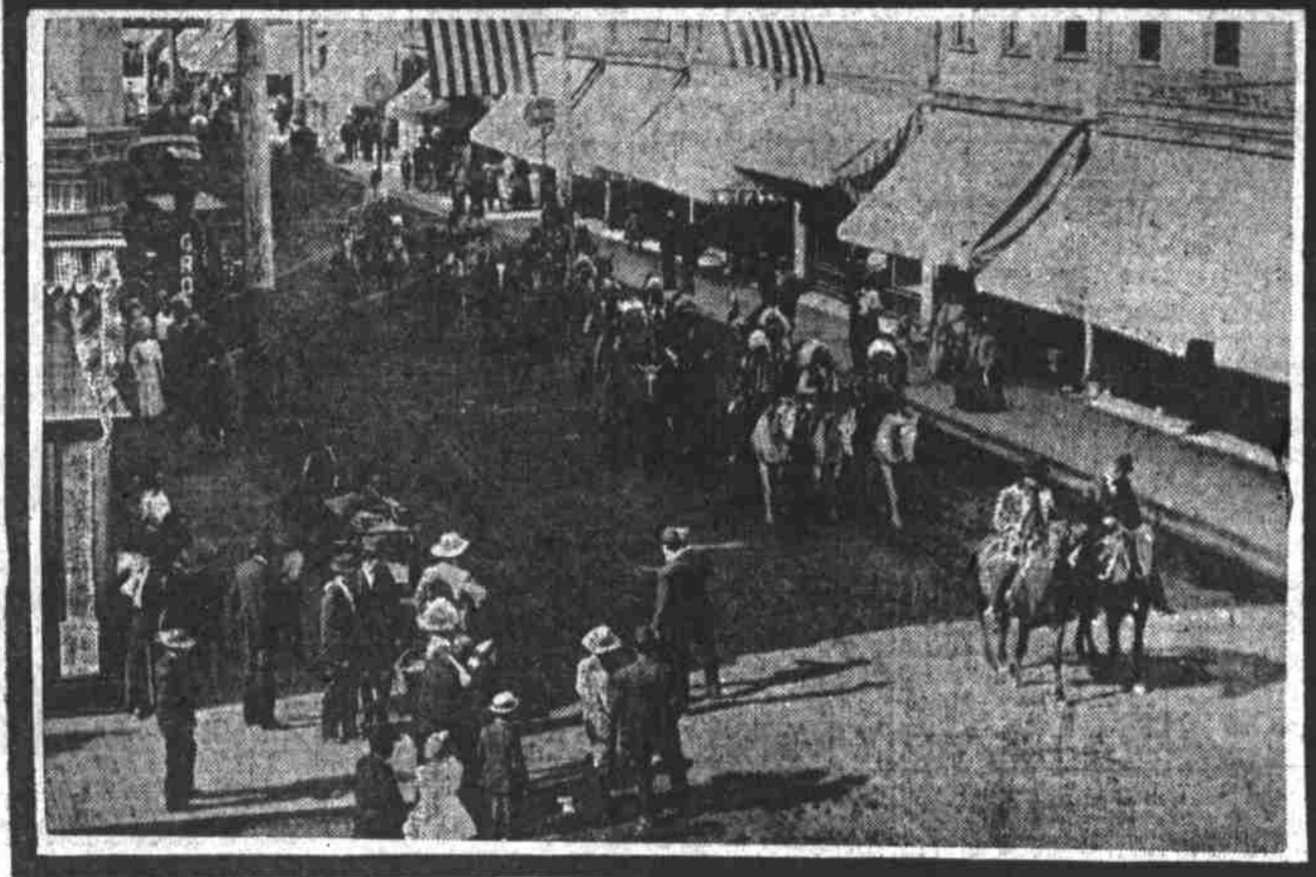
**THE DALLES, ONE OF THE RICHEST CITIES IN THE STATE
COMPARED WITH POPULATIONS—SOME OF ITS RESOURCES**

The Dalles, Nov. 7.—The old-time buckskin-clothed frontiersman has given up the fight and acknowledges that his zone is narrowing and his habits changing. He still exists in some places along the upper Columbia river, though the rough edges have been worn from his disposition and his makeup by the modern civilization that is closing in around him. Perhaps the undefined thing which we can not understand about this character is the secret of his great success combined with that of his total failure. His aimless wanderings through The Dalles country neither made a past nor assured a future for this new empire. He was no broader than the lone Indian trail and spelled no progress whatever. This was his farm, and he reaped his harvest of fur where no man sowed or tilled.

Missionaries of 1838.
When the Methodist missionaries came to The Dalles in 1838, they planted the seed of a Christian civilization, and today eight churches are organized in this thrifty city. Five graded schools, with 22 competent teachers, tell the same story. From an industrial standpoint the city has much to be proud of; it is first of all a fruit center. Last year 4,000 tons were shipped from The Dalles to 10 different states 42,000 boxes of prunes and plums by express and 24 carloads of fruit by freight. These shipments brought in \$125,000 to the growers, and not over 5 per cent of fruit lands are now under cultivation. The salmon cannery shipped 1,200,000 cans of salmon last year. There were 4,000 cases of Royal Ann cherries sent out.

The city also has two flour mills that turn out 1,600 barrels of flour per day. The scouring mills handle annually 3,000,000 pounds of wool. Forty carloads of watermelons and cantaloupes were shipped during the present season. More than 100,000 young cherry trees have recently been planted, this being one of The Dalles' leading industries. A cherry orchard usually contains about 60

trees to the acre. These trees produce on an average 200 pounds of cherries per year. The average price paid at the canneries is 5 cents a pound.

Valuable Water Power.
The Dalles is one of the richest cities in the state in regard to water power. All their manufacturing plants are driven by electricity, and they still have much power to spare. For more than half a century this has been a prominent meeting point for different tribes of Indians located on reservations many miles to the north and south. Each fall they come to the Columbia river to secure their supply of fish for winter, also to visit and trade with each other and with the whites. At present they are seen in large numbers on the streets at The Dalles.

The present progress and prosperity of The Dalles is due in a large part to an organization known as the Business Men's association, of which J. M. Patterson is both secretary and general manager.

FOR BRYAN, 162**

**Case From Canada to Give
Divorce Mill of Nevada a Grist.**

Reno, Nev., Nov. 7.—Mrs. Chita Millicent Franklin Burch, wife of one of the wealthiest managing contractors of Montreal, Canada, and direct descendant of a peer of England, is preparing evidence to present in a suit for divorce against her husband, who, she alleges, deserted her six years ago in England. The woman has been living quietly here for a year in order to establish residence, before bringing suit for separation. She asks for an absolute decree and the custody of her little daughter, Ghita Louise Iole, 10 years of age.
The complaint alleges that her husband deserted her six years ago, when they were living in England. She says she followed him to Montreal, where that discussed their troubles and that he agreed at that time to support the

child, but declared he would not live with her any longer.
The daughter is at present in the convent of St. Anne and Jerome, Quebec. The wife says she is the owner of an estate of property at Reading, England, and will come into possession of it when her aunt, now 84 years of age, dies. She asks permission to resume her maiden name, Ghita Millicent Miller.

Mrs. John Buff, eye cut by glass.
Mrs. Brewer, cut on head by glass.
E. W. Emmons, bruised.
Miss N. T. Sisson, bruised.
Emmons and Miss Sisson were passengers on the Crown Hill car. The others were injured in the wreck of the Washington car, which was turned over on its side when driven from the track by the force of the collision.

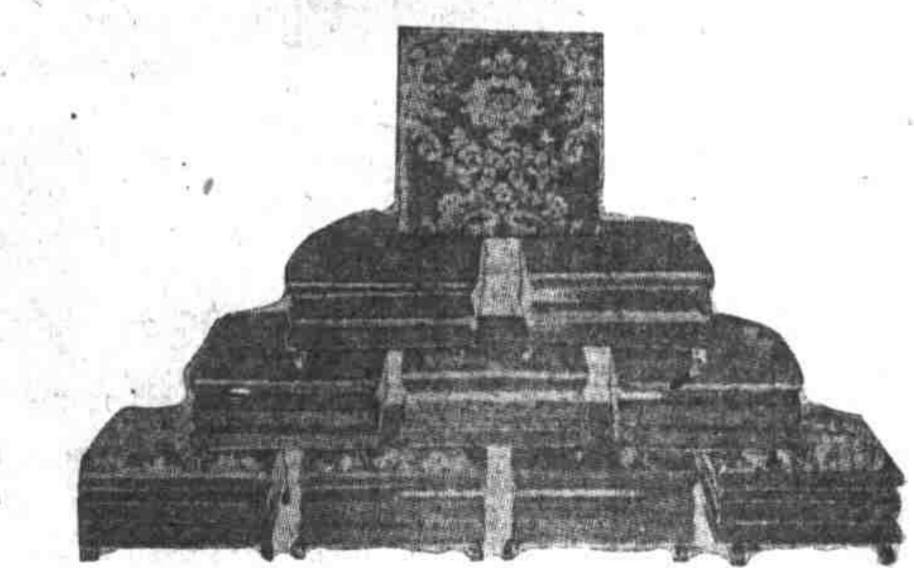

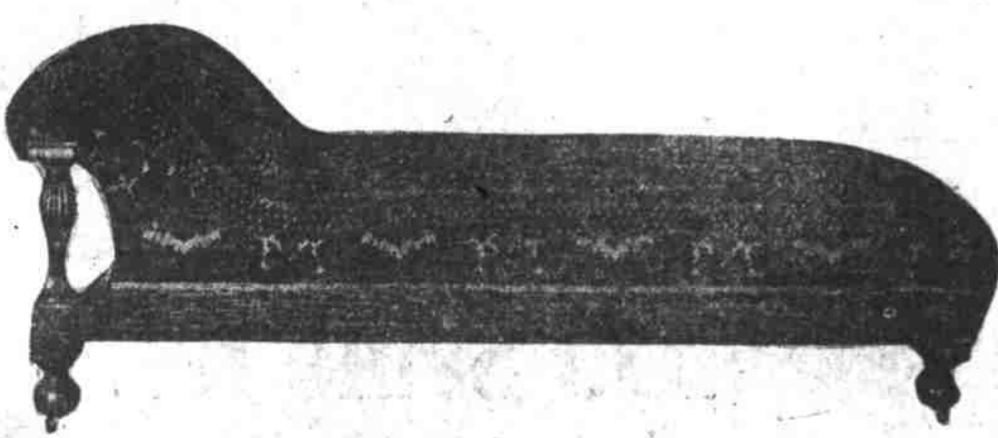

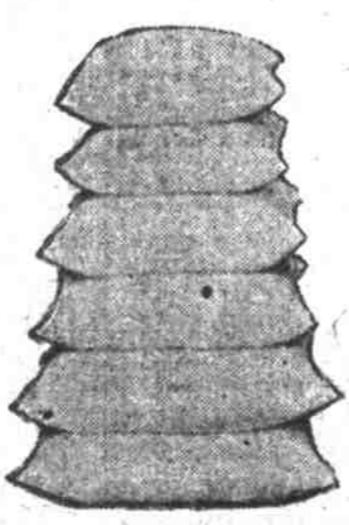
