The Milwaukee municipal election will be held on the first Monday in December. At that time two councilmen, a city auditor, treasurer, and city clerk will be chosen in addition to a successor to Mayor William Schindler, who has declared that he will not be a candidate for reelection.

Joe Leslie, who made his escape from the jail at Vancouver, Wash., Wednesday night, was recaptured yesterday afternoon by Deputy Sheriff Leonard. The officer received information that the man was headed for Oregon City, so he went to the Clackamas county town and walked the ties back toward Portland until he met the fugitive. Leslie was originally arrested Tuesday near Kalama by Sheriff Stevens, Deputy Leonard and Chief of Police S. E. Wood of Vancouver. He had 185 handkerchiefs with him, and was charged with stealing them from a boxcar after escaping from jail he rowed across the Columbia, walked into Portland and started for Oregon City.

Plans for the ratification of the election which were being arranged for tomorrow night by the Republican central committee have been abandoned for the present, but the question will be taken up early next week, when arrangements will be made for the ratification to take the form of a popular banquet. After canvassing the subject, the committee decided that there was not sufficient time to get up such a ratification as was originally proposed. The committee consisting of C. E. Lockwood, E. L. Shaffer and Charles Conroy will meet early next week to perfect arrangements for the banquet.

A verdict for defendants was given in the case of Milton W. Smith against J. C. Bayer and Peter Hobkirk in the Oregon circuit court yesterday afternoon. Some time ago Smith secured judgment for \$100 on a note, but the trial was ordered by the state supreme court. The note was originally given by the defendants to the Concord Loan and Trust company, for which J. Thorburn Ross was agent, and Ross was one of the important witnesses. The trial occupied two full days.

That J. H. Truby, ex-assistant cashier of the Oregon Trust & Savings bank and at present a member of the brokerage firm of Cook & Truby, and who was stricken with an attack of heart failure last Monday, will recover is the word given out at the Crystal Springs sanitarium where he was taken shortly after the attack. The doctor in charge, Dr. E. H. Lytle Bothe, is of the opinion that Mr. Truby might not rally and that the attack would prove fatal, but the doctors state this morning that he is feeling much better and that he will soon leave the sanitarium.

Joseph Weloga, proprietor of a saloon at Sixteenth and Savier streets, was fined \$25 by Judge Van Zante this morning for selling liquor to a man already intoxicated. The saloon men have recently been arrested on this charge, and in almost every instance a rather heavy fine has resulted. Charles Nelson had been out of another saloon, so drunk was he, but Patrolman Swennes found him buying liquor at Weloga's bar.

The return of Dr. W. H. Hepps to Grace Methodist Episcopal church for his second year's work will be celebrated tonight with a reception to Dr. Hepps and family, given under the auspices of the Ladies' Aid society of the church. The choir composed of 20 or more voices will take part in the entertainment, assisted by the Lakme quartet of ladies' voices. Ethel Lytle Bothe will have charge of the music.

Although the two checks which Mrs. J. M. Gillespie of St. Johns lost Wednesday evening had been indorsed by her and could have been easily converted into cash, they were returned yesterday afternoon. She received from the postoffice an envelope postmarked "St. Johns," and containing nothing but the checks, one for \$27.30 and the other for \$19.80.

MAY ABOLISH STEAM CARS

Ordinance Passed by Council Can Be Enforced, Says City Attorney.

The steam train exclusion ordinance, passed by the city council nearly 18 months ago, will go into effect November 12. An opinion rendered by City Attorney Kavanaugh says that the Southern Pacific cannot be compelled, after that date, to discontinue the use of the steam locomotives now in service on Fourth street between Gilsan and the southern limits of the city. The railway may also be forced to cease operating freight cars, the lawyer holds. However, while the city might use its police power to stop night traffic on Fourth street, its action in so doing would be subject to review by the courts. Under the ordinance the council at its discretion may extend the use of the streets to the Southern Pacific. In case the council should not decide to enforce the ordinance, the mayor may instruct the city attorney to bring mandamus suit in the courts. If the ordinance is enforced it means that the Southern Pacific will practically be put out of business, for the present at least, the company has no electric locomotives here. If the railroad chooses to violate the provisions of the ordinance, it is subject to a maximum daily fine of \$500.
