COUNCIL SUSTAINS LANE'S WOMEN-IN-SALOONS VETO

CELLARS ORDINANCE MUST STAND AS LAW

Cottel and Concannon Change Their Votes—Rushlight Says He Will Introduce Ordinance That Will Affect All Liquor Dealers—Concannon's Views

Without any discussion the city council this morning by a vote of 8 to 7 sustained Mayor Lane's veto of the Rushlight amendment to the Cellars saloon ordinance. Councilmen Cottel and Concannon who had voted for the amendment at the last council meeting changed their minds and recorded themselves against it.

LEO BEZEMER, KIDNAPER, CAUGHT

After a Tracy-Like Flight Notorious "Whistling Rufus" Is Captured in In-glorious Slumber—Won't Talk About English.

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 11.—After eluding a determined armed posse for 15 days, during which he was the spectacular figure in several bold flights for liberty, Leo Bezemer, alias "Whistling Rufus," who on October 26 chained E. P. English, a wealthy logger, to a tree near Mount Vernon, Skagit county, and demanded \$5,000 for his release, was captured by Deputy Sheriff J. W. Wheeler, Joe Hill and Steve Meek at 2 o'clock this morning at the home of David Foy, a farmer on the south shore of Bitter lake, nine miles north-west of this city.
