OREGON AND WASHINGTON ENGLERS RALLY TO SUPPORT AND ELEVEN TAKES HARD WORKOUT.

Seattle Team Expects to Win Annual Game From Old Opponents.

University of Oregon, Eugene, Nov. 11.—Coach Forbes put the football team through the most grueling practice last night which has been held this year and the men showed that there was still a good deal of spirit left in them.

May Retrieve Laurels. If the team plays Saturday as it did today Oregon would retrieve her lost laurels. There was none of the lifelessness which characterized the play of Oregon last Saturday and allowed Whitworth to win.

Another fact which will also tend to strengthen the team is that there will be no more over-confidence. Both the team and the students realize that there is a hard battle before it next Saturday and that every bit of "Oregon spirit" will be needed.

While of course the students feel gloomy over Whitworth's victory, it is being excellent in raising enthusiasm and the student body will back the team as never before.

Two changes were made in the lineup last night, McIntyre being returned to the line and Main taking his place at half. McIntyre is fast and heavy, but is not as heady a player as Main.

RACE TRACK MEN WILL FIGHT HARD

San Francisco, Nov. 11.—With the election over and the session of the legislature of the state but little more than a month away, the interests for and against the racetrack gambling in some class, are aligning their forces for what will probably be one of the most interesting battles ever fought at the state capital.

The California Anti-Racetrack league has been working for several years for the issue that will come before the state legislature and which will be the hardest fight of its record this winter.

On the other hand the death of racetrack gambling in many eastern states has left California one of the few places where betting on horse races is still permitted and racetrack men from all over the state are joining hands to put up the fight of their lives.

It is admitted that the death of racetrack betting in California would be next to that in New York and a tremendous attack against the proposed anti-racetrack bill will be made by the California Jockey club probably under the direction of President Tom Williams.

The proposition to repeal the racetrack bill is the bill which will be the same as that which has gone for years in California legislatures; that it will pass the legislature and will be signed by the governor.

It was learned today from an authoritative source that the "corruption" bill of the Republican party, which will control the next legislature, has announced to the racetrack people that they will have a hard time of it in the legislature this year.

This year will be the first time that the legislature of Oregon will have been called upon to act upon a straight moral issue for years, and it is understood that the leaders of the organization have resolved to fight the bill with a mighty effort to win.

Last year W. S. C. lost to Idaho by one point, unquestionably on account of over-confidence, and it is desired to prevent a similar happening this year.

The State college eleven returned from Seattle Monday night, having played the state university to a standstill in that city. The players are bumped and bruised from head to foot, and it is likely will need more rest than will be available for them between today and next Friday.
