

### TRAINING VESSEL ANCHORS OUTSIDE

#### Herzogin Sophie Charlotte Makes Fast Run from Bremen.

#### WAITS FOR ORDERS AS TO DESTINATION

One of North German Lloyd's School Ships on Which Sailors Are Trained to Become Officers in the Company's Fleet.

The North German Lloyd's big training ship, Herzogin Sophie Charlotte, is lying at anchor off the mouth of the Columbia river waiting for orders whether to go to Portland or Puget sound to receive dispatch, being under charter to carry wheat to Europe.

The Herzogin Sophie Charlotte arrived off the river this morning after one of the smartest voyages for a long time from Europe to the Columbia. She left Bremen, Germany, exactly 112 days ago today and the fact that there were no orders from the company when she signalled were hoisted this morning goes to indicate that she beat even the expectations of the owners. An advertisement made in 140 days, she will be seen that the training ship must have been on the move most of the time.

The North German Lloyd maintains two training ships on which it schools officers for its big fleet of freight and passenger steamers. The other was training ship the Herzogin Cecelie, which was here some years ago with a cargo of salt and took a load of wheat for return cargo. The Herzogin Cecelie and her cadets attracted much attention when here.

It is believed that the Herzogin Sophie Charlotte will be given orders to proceed to Puget sound for which port she has been listed by the maritime registers for several weeks past.

The French bark Marechal Noailles, which arrived up in the harbor last night, was 28 days making the run from Honolulu to the Columbia. Her performance being a strong contrast to that of the training ship. But she was here because the Marechal Noailles is not a good sailor; the winds were against her and for days in a stretch, in a destructive gale, the bark was driven back and drifted back over her track for hundreds of miles. Then after riding out the storm she fell into a calm that held her almost in one position for three days. But the last few days of the voyage brought good sailing and the bark showed that she could be done under favorable conditions.

The Marechal Noailles is in ballast this time and has gone to the way out of the harbor before starting for Portland, thereby giving a big piece of the French government bounty. From Portland the bark will go to Europe with a cargo of wheat shipped by the Portland Flouring Mills company.

#### FORMERLY GERMAN BARK

#### Barge Quatsino Was Known as the Arthur Fitger.

About two years ago the German bark Arthur Fitger left Portland for Europe. Fire broke out in the cargo while the vessel was loading and eventually the barge was sold to a company in British Columbia and converted into a barge.

Yesterday afternoon the barge, renamed the Quatsino, returned to this port with a cargo of 2,000 tons of coal from Nanaimo. The coal is being loaded at Alameda dock and the barge is attracting much attention because of its large dimensions. The cargo is consigned to Frank Waterhouse & Co.

#### AT THE SEAMAN'S INSTITUTE
