INSPECTION OF COAST LUMBER

Central Bureau Will Probably Be Established for the Northwest.

In order to obviate the confusion resulting from having two lumber inspection bureaus in the northwest a committee appointed by the large lumber buyers of the San Francisco Merchants' exchange has reported favorably on a central inspection bureau for foreign shipments of Oregon and Washington lumber.

In case this is done the Oregon and Washington Manufacturers will insist that the Oregon central bureau be maintained at Portland, Grays Harbor, either Aberdeen or Hoquiam at either Seattle or Tacoma and at Coos Bay.

The Oregon and Washington bureau has favored and used independent inspection for some time in preference to mill inspection and acted on the theory that the buyer of lumber has as much right to be represented in the inspection as the seller.

On the committee appointed to consider the question were Messrs. Ward of the American Trading company, Company of Bowring & Co., and J. Moore of the J. J. Moore company as representatives of the Australian buyers and Messrs. A. J. Baxter of the Wellington Bay Lumber company, Chesebrough of the Tacoma Mill company, and E. K. Wood of the E. K. Wood Lumber company.

A. B. Wastell, secretary of the Oregon and Washington lumber inspection bureau who is a supporter of the plan to form one bureau that will represent both buyer and seller and independent inspection visited the buyers on a recent trip to San Francisco.

"I stated to the members of the exchange that the Oregon lumbermen were anxious to have one bureau," said Mr. Wastell this morning, "and that our method of maintaining a corps of independent tallymen and inspectors has given independent representation on every vessel loading at mills of our membership and that we desire to assure them of our active cooperation in their effort and that fair consideration would be given to any suggestion the buyers might make."

It appears that at the first meeting when the committee was appointed it was stated on the floor of the exchange that the Oregon and Washington Lumber Inspection bureau had taken the right step in the direction of independent inspection when organized and had given good satisfaction on its export business.
