## MONACO RULER 60 YEARS OLD

Income \$250,000 From Monte Carlo—Spends It in Ocean Dredging.

Paris, Nov. 13.—A dispatch from Monte Carlo says that flags were everywhere displayed throughout Monaco today in celebration of the sixtieth birthday of Prince Albert, the reigning prince of the little Mediterranean principality which derives its entire revenues from the world-famous gambling casino of Monte Carlo. Prince Albert at the present time is absent from his little domain on one of his scientific expeditions. His chief delight is marine dredging, and he has often told his friends that if the state of his finances did not depend on the Monte Carlo tables he would have long since ordered their suppression. The prince draws \$250,000 a year from the syndicate which controls the gambling privileges. The heir to the throne is Prince Louis, a son of Prince Albert by his first wife, Lady Mary Hamilton, who was the sister of the Duke of Hamilton. He was divorced from her in 1880 and several years later married the widow of the Duke of Richelieu. She was originally Miss Alice Helme of New Orleans, and her father was a wealthy Hebrew banker. Prince Albert's one passion is the study of oceanography. He has published many volumes on this subject and in order to be better able to pursue his investigations he had built at enormous expense a vessel equipped with scientific apparatus and fitted with a glass bottom for observations of the ocean bed.

## COLONEL TORNEY TO BE SURGEON-GENERAL

## LOST TEN YEARS; FOUND IN ASYLUM

Scientist of Some Eminence Identified by Wife He Cannot Recognize.

(United Press Leased Wire.) New York, Nov. 13.—"John Doe No. 8" of a week ago is known today as Professor Mark W. Harrington, in the Morris Plains, N. J., asylum for the insane. He was at one time chief of the United States weather bureau. The scientist, who has been missing since 1899, was received at the asylum from Trenton, N. J., eight months ago. Professor Harrington was identified yesterday by his wife, though he showed no sign of recognition of her. She said that shortly after his disappearance, nearly 10 years ago, he had written to her in a peculiar way and that she received another letter from him two years later. After that no word came and she gave him up as dead. The family got trace of the professor when his son, Raymond Harrington, read a description of him in a western paper as that of a man found within a public park at Trenton. He told his mother, and Professor Harrington was found.

## ANARCHISTS CREATE REIGN OF TERROR

(United Press Leased Wire.) Copenhagen, Nov. 13.—A band of Russian anarchist workmen have been creating a reign of terror, plundering and murdering in the outlying districts during the past week. Several days ago they fired a large farm, killed the land steward with a knife and shot the farmer. Two days later they burned a second farm and shot the proprietor. The same gang raided a farm near Copenhagen belonging to a man named Beck head of a prominent Danish ecclesiastical family, shooting and stabbing him before the eyes of his wife and children. They made off with everything they could get, taking the rings from the fingers of his wife, who was stabbed in the back.

## WEE COINS FROM MINT AT FRISCO

For First Time Pennies and 5-Cent Pieces Will Be Coined There.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Nov. 13.—Dies for the coining of copper cents and nickel five-cent pieces, together with the copper and other metal for making these coins, are on their way from Washington to this city and the stamps that have been almost exclusively devoted to turning out eagles and double eagles will soon be stamping the meanest coins stamped by Uncle Sam. Until now the Philadelphia mint has had a monopoly of the coining of cents and five-cent pieces. The growing demand for the small coins on the Pacific coast and in the Rocky mountain region has led Director Leach of the mint to start their coining here. Last year San Francisco used 23,000,000 cent pieces, and so far this year has ordered \$60,000 more. The supply of nickels on the Pacific coast has been getting low and these will be coined also. The coining of the small money will be begun in 10 days.

## LEWISTON SHIPS 5,000,000 LBS.

Fruit Business for This Season Smashes All Previous Records.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Lewiston, Idaho, Nov. 13.—The fruit shipping season of Lewiston-Clarkston valley is practically at an end and a summary of its magnitude may be had from the estimate given out today from figures compiled by railroad and express officials placing the aggregate at about 5,000,000 pounds and the returns to the grower at \$250,000. A fifth more added for home and local consumption and two fifths for the consumption of three canneries located in the valley, and the total for the industry for the year is about known. The sources mentioned above it is known that 200,667 boxes of all fruits, except cherries, were sent out from Lewiston, either by freight or express, having an aggregate of 4,128,638 pounds. The cherry shipments aggregated \$6,160 boxes, totaling 661,600 pounds. This included the 22 straight cars of cherries, 10 by freight and 12 by express, that were sent out during the season. The apple crop for the valley is the best ever grown, as more attention was paid to ridding the crop of rodding moths and other insect pests. This crop will be largely used to supply local demand, which in former years has been supplied from outside points.

## JAP CHOKES HIS LIFE OUT

T. Saka, in Jail at Seattle, Gives a Display of Supreme Nerve.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Seattle, Wash., Nov. 13.—Hanging from a leather belt fastened to a steam pipe in his cell, the lifeless body of T. Saka, a Japanese charged with grand larceny, was found this morning in the north corridor of the city prison. He had apparently hung for hours, choking his life out slowly and deliberately and yet never flinching or making a sound that attracted attention from even the nearest of his fellow prisoners.

## HONORE PALMER BUYS MORE LAND

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Medford, Or., Nov. 13.—Honore Palmer, son of the late Chicago millionaire, has purchased 1,300 acres of land in this section. The body of land is one of the most productive in the country and lies on both sides of the Rogue river, 12 miles north of Medford. It has the finest fishing grounds on the coast and is well known to many famous fishermen from abroad. The price paid for the land is \$37,000 cash. Mr. Palmer expects to divide the land into five and 10-acre tracts and place them on the market.
