

# THE WORLD'S MARKETS

## POULTRY PRICE HALF CENT HIGH

Advance Along Front Street—Fat Turkeys Bring 17 1/2c Pound.

**PORTLAND WHOLESALE MARKETS**  
Another poultry advance. Steady tone in eggs. Cranberry market is firm. Four cars banana. Dressed hogs quiet easy. Scarcity of dressed veal. Hog activity is forced. Potatoes and onions steady.

**Poultry Market Advanced Again.**  
Another advance of 1/2c a pound is shown in the entire chicken market along Front street today. Mixed lots are being freely called for around 12c a pound and a good demand is noted in hens around 12 1/2c. Some dealers are asking a fraction more than these quotations, but so far as known nothing higher is obtainable at the moment.

**Bank Market Duty on Hops.**  
Herman Klaber of this city, a member of the firm of Klaber, Wolf & Co., has been selected by the larger hop growers of California to go to Washington in an effort to secure an advance in the duty on foreign hops. The duty is now at 12c, but an effort will be made to have it doubled at the next session of congress.

**Forwarding Activity in Hops.**  
With only a few dealers showing orders for hops at this time, the local market looks as if the activity is artificial. While there remains a demand for hop-shedders, there is but little of this quality remaining unsold at the moment. Most dealers are unable to secure orders and the activity is confined entirely to the United States. There is no rush of business in the east or in Europe.

**Cranberry Market Is Firm.**  
There is a firm tone ruling in the cranberry market at this time. For local stock the best quality is moving around \$9.00 a barrel, while the market for the east is quoted around \$11.50 a barrel. According to the trade news arrivals from the east will cost more to land here.

**Four Cars Bananas Arrived in Quite Good Shape This Morning.**  
There is a pronounced scarcity in the supplies of dressed veal in the front street markets and in consequence prices are being held stiff. Southern hogs are asking a slight advance in price on this account.

**Arrivals of Dressed Hogs Along Front Street are Again Quiet Here, and that reason the tone of the market is just about steady enough to maintain values.**  
While there is practically no movement of local potatoes to the south at this time owing to the high prices being paid by home growers and their disposition to hold, the tone remains quite steady along Front street and prices are being well maintained. The market for onions are steady with no change in values and growers showing not the slightest disposition to advance.

**Beans Are Firmer Again.**  
Additional strength is again shown throughout the bean market and prices on the various lines are being firmly held. For the time being the market is chiefly good and today the local trade is quoting an advance of 1/4c per pound. Other grades are showing no change in price.

**Brief Notes of Front Street.**  
Apple market shows a good movement with most sales around \$1.50 a box.  
Sweet potatoes are showing a good movement with prices being held stiff. Good grades are getting scarce.  
Sugar market is quiet at the decline of 2c quotation today.  
Cabbage offerings are showing no increase and prices are therefore holding up to the top notch for good quality.

**There is added firmness in the local barley situation, even though there was a fractional decline in San Francisco prices during today's session.** There is said to be some buying of barley for foreign account, but this can not be confirmed at the moment. In any event the trade is more anxious to buy barley than for some time, and during the day the firmness in the market is shown on the board of trade for November delivery at \$26.50 a ton. There was no change in futures on the board during the day, but the market was firmer.

**Oats market was quiet, with prices maintained at yesterday's figures.** The market was active in the bid for December wheat today at 91 1/2c, but no change is noted in the November. The flour market is gaining strength from local trading, but foreigners are showing no disposition to engage the attention of the trade.

**Wheat market is firmer, although buyers are not paying over 90c for club on the track Portland.** Even at this price, buyers say they are not able to buy any business.

**Portland Union Stockyards, Nov. 13.**  
Every evidence is at hand which seems to assure a better demand for cattle within the near future. The principal improvement will likely come in well neglected stuff, for already the call for this grade is better than it was a week ago. While no sales have been made over \$4 for best steers, buyers are showing a better disposition to take supplies than they were a short time ago. It has been only in the ordinary quality that supplies were hard to move during recent trade because packers' wants were small, owing to their heavy accumulations.

**Hog market is holding quite well at the advance of yesterday, although the top for the stuff which arrived during the past 24 hours did not bring more than \$6.10.** Sheep supplies are small and the market is disposed to do better for the finer grade stuff.

**Expect an Improvement Soon.**  
"I have no doubt that there will be an improvement in the market for top select steers within the next week or 10 days," said J. G. Gault of Benson & Gault today. "The market is showing up slightly better in tone even at this time. Hogs and sheep are very likely to remain as they are for awhile."

## HARRIMAN BUYS MORE WELLS-FARGO STOCK

Within the past few days representatives of the New York law firm of Sullivan & Cromwell have been in Boston offering \$200 per share to New England holders of Wells Fargo company stock, and stating that they were buying the stock for Harriman. Wells Fargo sold Wednesday for \$210 a share in New York. The company pays dividends of 10 per cent and it is understood to be earning largely in excess of this amount.

**Woolgrowers are for a better range.**  
Boise, Idaho, Nov. 13.—Alarmed at the increasing restrictions being laid down by the forestry bureau, the Idaho Woolgrowers' association has adopted resolutions condemning the policy of the government. The association also proposes that the National Woolgrowers' association and the Chicago chamber of commerce for the storage of wool at Chicago until prices rise to the wool standard. A half million pounds of next year's crop are signed up to insure the delivery at the Chicago warehouse. Governor Gooding heretofore known as an advocate of the forest policy of the government, said: "I have no objection to the wool standard."
