(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, Nov. 14.—Franklin K. Lane, interstate commerce commissioner and the lifelong friend of Francis J. Heney, said today that the shooting was not a surprise to those acquainted with the scope of the Ruff prosecution.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Marshfield, Or., Nov. 14.—R. D. Hume, the salmon king, who was taken ill at his home at Warburton today morning, has died. He was 67 years of age. Physicians say the end may come at any moment.

After 26 hours in the jury room, the 12 men who are considering the fate of Jack La Rose, whose trial for the murder of Hyman Neuman ended yesterday morning, have given no sign of agreement on a verdict. As time wears on without word from the jury room the impression gains ground that the result will be a disagreement, although the attorneys on each side still hope for a verdict favorable to them.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Nov. 14.—The county jail at Ingleside has the appearance of a fortification today. Uniformed policemen patrol the outer wall armed with rifles, and no visitor is allowed within 200 feet of them.

All efforts to prosecute Carl Sites for his alleged misconduct with Eva Brown has been abandoned, as investigation has shown that there is no substantial testimony for prosecuting him.

F. J. COOPER HINTS SUSPICION OF PLOT

(United Press Leased Wire.) Denver, Col., Nov. 14.—The attempted assassination of Francis J. Heney, I believe, will tend to solidify public sentiment in favor of the prosecution, said F. J. Cooper, head of the "Million Club" of San Francisco, at the Brown Palace hotel today.

Mr. Hume served one term in the legislature as representative from Coos and Curry counties and has always been an active Republican.
