

SPORTSMEN DO NOT WISH CHANGE

Present Game Protection Laws Deemed Sufficiently Effective for Neighbors.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) North Yakima, Wash., Nov. 14.—Yakima county sportsmen are much opposed to any change in the present system of game protection...

"We, the undersigned sportsmen and friends of game protection, herewith respectfully petition your honorable body to use your influence against the passage of the bill (number unknown) which provides for a state game system to take the place of the present county game system."

"We are unqualifiedly and earnestly opposed to the passage of this above bill, for the reason that it is detrimental to the interests of game protection, and that it is a measure that is not necessary for the best protection of the game and is likely to arouse a hostile sentiment towards all game protective measures in the future."

"We are perfectly satisfied with the present system of county home rule with regard to the disposal of all money derived from hunting licenses and furthermore are satisfied with the present license system and do not want it changed."

"We also suggest the prompt passing of a law prohibiting the killing of Chinese, English, Golden, Reeves, Mongolian, Silver, Blackneck and Japanese pheasants, or any other pheasants which may be released to sport, for a period of two years in the state of Washington, and that a proper penalty for killing the same shall be made."

CORNERSTONE OF CHURCH LAID

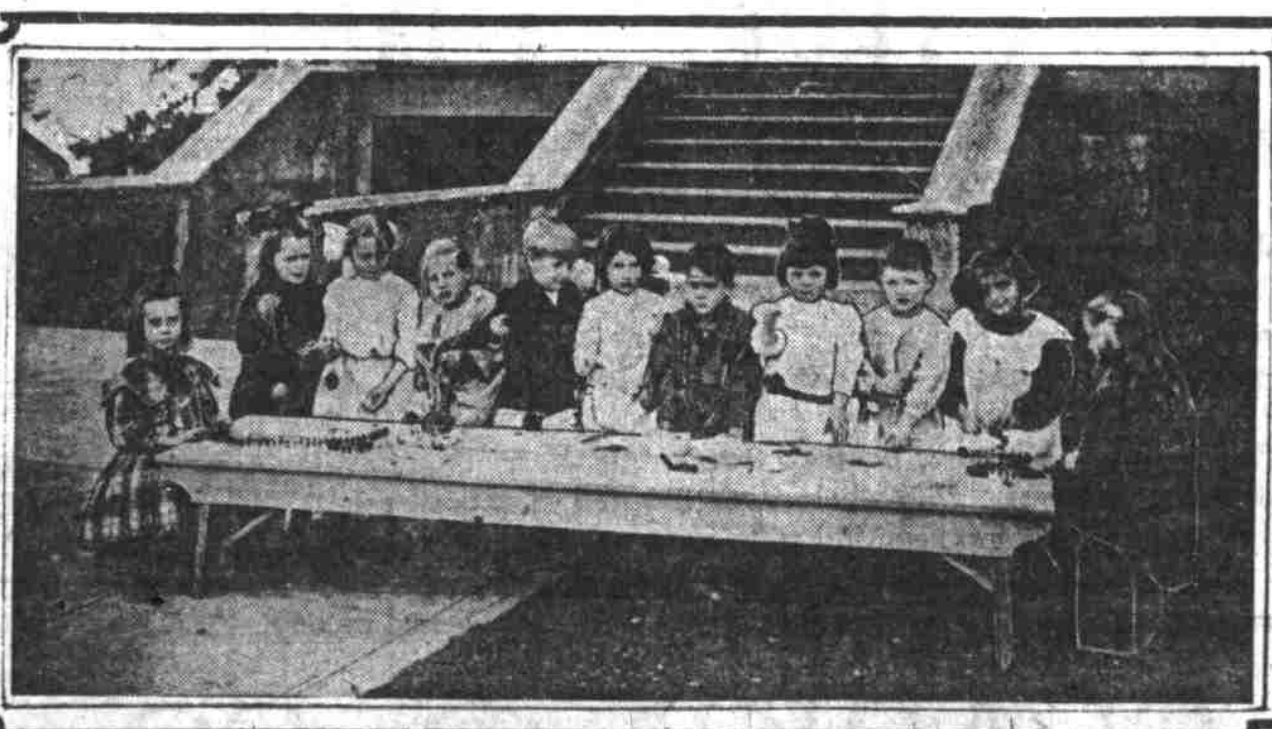

William Bybee. Jacksonville, Or., Nov. 14.—William Bybee, 78 years of age, a pioneer of Jackson county, Oregon, died Wednesday at his home near Jacksonville. Mr. Bybee was a native of Winchester, Clark county, Ky. In 1854 he came to Oregon and in 1864 to Jacksonville, where he took up a donation land claim, which was his home at the time of his death. In 1869, Mr. Bybee was associated with Jesse Walker in protesting the settlers against the depredations of the Indians. In 1878 he was elected sheriff of Jackson county and served in that capacity for four years. In 1884 he was married to Miss Elizabeth Walker, a daughter of Jesse Walker, and 11 children blessed this union, five of whom are living. Mrs. Bybee died in 1907. The surviving children are Mrs. Charles Prim of Jacksonville, Mrs. Frank Long, Medford; William Byee, Alaska; Frank Bybee, Jacksonville, and Robert Bybee, Idaho. Funeral services will be under the auspices of Jacksonville Lodge, No. 100, P. O. of which he had been a member since 1894.
