HENEY RESOLUTIONS MAY BE OPPOSED

BAR ASSOCIATION TO BE PUT TO TEST

Graft Prosecutor Will Probably Receive Endorsement From Oregon Attorneys, But Some Fear Other Influences May Prevail at Tomorrow's Meeting

HENEY RESOLUTIONS TO BE ADOPTED BY OREGON BAR ASSOCIATION

Be it resolved by the Oregon Bar association, That we deplore and deprecate the violence offered Francis J. Heney on Friday, November 13, 1908, while at his post of duty, and do hereby tender to Mrs. Heney our deep sympathy and to Mr. Heney our sincere wishes for a speedy recovery and an early resumption in person of the cases which brought him into the danger from which he has suffered.

The foregoing resolutions deploring the recent attempt to assassinate Francis J. Heney in San Francisco, were introduced by Ralph B. Fisher, by request, this morning at the opening session of the annual meeting of the Oregon Bar association. Mr. Fisher saying that if they did not meet with too violent protest, he would urge their adoption tomorrow when they would be taken up in the regular order of business.

THERE WAS A TIME WHEN THE OREGONIAN BELIEVED HONEST MEN SHOULD KEEP THEIR WORD

In the days when the Oregonian believed that a solemn pledge voluntarily made by a legislator to his constituents should be fulfilled, and when it believed that men should be as true to their word in public as in private life, it commented with great severity upon the perfidy of two representatives from Multnomah county who pledged themselves, in advance of their nomination and election, to vote for J. N. Dolph for United States senator, but who afterward repudiated this promise.

RUEF LAWYER SEEKS MORE DELAY

Dozier Files Supplementary Affidavit, Which Foolish Law Permits—Desperate Effort to Save Arch Graft—Shameless Attorneys.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Nov. 17.—When the superior court convened this morning for its second session since the attempted murder of Francis J. Heney, graft prosecutor, last Friday, the same military aspect marked its deliberations.

Lawyers Fear People.

Henry Holt and Thomas B. Dozier, Ruef's attorneys, were driven to the court building guarded by detectives.

Thomas B. Dozier opened the court proceedings by filing a supplementary affidavit to support the motion of Ruef's counsel for a change of venue made in the afternoon session, the objection to the filing of the affidavit, on the ground that it was stipulated that all evidentiary affidavits in support of the motion for a change of venue were to have been filed by the defense yesterday.

Law Prohibits Criminals.

Ruef's counsel opposed the objection with the statement that it was expressly stipulated by law and by the attorneys in the case that the motion could be renewed at any stage of the trial and that affidavits covering a period of time subsequent to the ruling of yesterday's affidavits could be introduced in support of the motion for a change of venue at any time.

EXTRA EXTRA EXTRA RUEF'S CHAUFFEUR CAUGHT BY A PORTLAND DETECTIVE

Man Wanted to Connect Links in Bribery by Higher Ups Landed in Local Prison.

A. S. Lathan, wanted in San Francisco in connection with the Ruef graft case, was arrested this morning by City Detective Glen Howell. Lathan has a sweetheart in Portland. This became known to the authorities in San Francisco and the graft prosecution sent men to keep a lookout for the man.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Nov. 17.—Word was received here today by Detective William J. Burns that Alexander S. Lathan, who was Ruef's chauffeur in the days of graft and who has been a fugitive from justice since last January, was captured in Portland, Or., today by two of Burns' men. He will be extradited here that ex-Senator Gearin of Oregon has come forward as an attorney for Lathan and will fight extradition proceedings.

STATE HOLDS INTEREST IN LOCKS

State Supreme Court Confirms It in Denying Electric Interest's Petition for Rehearing—Accounting Due State.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Salem, Or., Nov. 17.—The state's interest in the locks at Oregon City to the amount of \$200,000 was today confirmed when the supreme court denied the petition for rehearing in the case of the state vs. the Portland General Electric company. This amount by today's decision is ascertained by a statement from the common school fund by virtue of an act of the legislature of 1870, which granted a like sum to the original company for the construction of the locks.

Other Decisions.

Other decisions today were as follows: Effie E. Leing vs. Arthur Leing, appealed from the court of Judge H. J. Bean, Unmulla county, affirmed by the court.

Bomb Kills Three in Factory.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Lorain, France, Nov. 17.—A bomb exploded today in the government school for the manufacture of high explosives, killing three attendants and wounding several others.

DESERTER DIES ON AN ICEBERG

Sailor's Body Found to Have Been Partially Devoured by Beasts.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Nov. 17.—News of the tragic fate of a deserter who was lost on a floating iceberg and eaten by animals of the Arctic region after he had slowly starved to death was brought to this port today by the whaler 'Karluk.' Fred Morand, a Frenchman, the deserter who decided to risk his life on the trackless wastes of the Arctic regions in November, 1907.

EMBEZZLEMENT THE CHARGE

E. C. Thompson, Arrested at Woodburn, Said to Be E. C. Haines of Iowa.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Salem, Or., Nov. 17.—E. C. Thompson, declared by the authorities to be E. C. Haines of Hardy, Iowa, and wanted in that state for embezzlement, was taken into custody by the marshal of Woodburn yesterday and is now lodged in the county jail of Marion county awaiting extradition. It is alleged that Haines was entrusted with a large sum of money with which to build and operate a creamery in Humboldt county, Iowa, but departed leaving those who advanced the money without recourse.

LEGISLATURE'S DUTY IS PLAIN

Only Double Dealing and Political Crookedness Can Prevent Election of Chamberlain Says James Cole, Republican Leader—North Dakota Case Immaterial.

Nothing short of plain crookedness and double dealing of the worst sort will prevent the observance of State-ment No. 1 pledges by members of the legislature and the consequent election of Governor Chamberlain to the United States senate, according to James Cole, Mr. Cole is the ex-deputy United States attorney who prosecuted the furniture trust, and otherwise made an enviable record for honesty and efficiency during his term of office.

LOSE CHARTER IF TRAINS STOPPED

Southern Pacific Manager Will Pin Defense on Old Grant From Government on Condition Trains Enter City of Portland.

That the Southern Pacific Railroad company has no right to cease running trains on Fourth street even if it wanted to is the contention of General Manager J. P. O'Brien and attorneys for the road, and will be made the basis for a suit to restrain the city from prosecuting Mr. O'Brien and attempting to stop the Fourth street trains from operating.
