WORK FOR THOUSANDS

North Coast Railway Will Push Its Construction Work.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) North Yakima, Wash., Nov. 17.—The North Coast railway will employ several thousand men through the winter on its construction work between Spokane and North Yakima. The president Straborn says that several contracts have been let east and west from Klona, and that men are being recruited wherever they can be found. Hundreds have been sent from this city and other places in this territory. Additional contracts are to be let within the next few days that will give employment to 250 more men. The route between Spokane and North Yakima has all been laid out and the rights of way purchased.

NORTH POWDER SHIPMENTS

104 Carloads of Grain and Hay During October, Last.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) North Powder, Or., Nov. 17.—One hundred and four carloads of grain and hay were shipped from North Powder in October, which is an increase over the same month in last year. There was a marked increase in cattle and horses, but the shipment of sheep was greatly decreased on account of lack of dipping facilities. Powder valuations are now shipping from that point.

BUSINESS HOUSES TAXED

\$100 Annual License for Near-Beer Establishments.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Fossil, Or., Nov. 17.—The council of Fossil has enacted an ordinance imposing a license upon people engaged in business or occupations within the city limits. The license runs all the way from \$2.50 to \$100 a year. The ordinance takes effect this week and affects nearly every trade and occupation. The most expensive establishments are placed under a \$100 a year license, which is also prohibitory here, and the prospect is that they will close up.

DEATH GRAZES CARRIER

Falling Tree Kills Horse and Demolishes Buggy.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Sherwood, Or., Nov. 17.—While returning on his route, S. D. Hagen, rural carrier on Route No. 5, was passing a gang of Japanese cutting wood, when a falling tree struck the buggy and horse, killing the horse and completely demolishing the buggy. Hagen escaped by throwing himself over the side of the vehicle. An investigation will be made to determine if any one has a right to fall timber across the public highway without stationing men to signal approaching teams.

POWER AT SHERWOOD

Little City Now Has Electric Current and Lights.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Sherwood, Or., Nov. 17.—Lights were installed in a few of the business houses, and the power turned on for the first time last night. Within a few days the entire system will be in running order. Power is furnished by a heavy gasoline engine.

CONFERENCE AT WASHINGTON

Governor Chamberlain Will Leave Latter Part of Month.

Salem, Or., Nov. 17.—In response to a request from Gifford Pinchot that he attend the conference on the conservation of national resources, which convenes in Washington, December 8, Governor Chamberlain will leave for the national capital the latter part of this month. He will return to Oregon about the middle of December.
