

TACOMA MAN DROVE TO DEATH SUICIDE

Alleged Embezzler of Thousands, Frank D. Pinkham, After Whirl of Wine, Women and Autos, Wearies of Life.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Louisville, Ky., Nov. 17.—A man who had been living here under the name of J. F. Hamilton committed suicide last night in his apartment by placing a tube from a gas jet in his mouth. In a letter written to a friend telling him he was going to commit suicide he gave the police their first notice. Going to the house they found the corpse. In the bedroom was a note asking that the Tacoma Milling company be notified of the death of their former cashier. Inquiry at Tacoma reveals that Hamilton was Frank D. Pinkham, who left Tacoma August 22.

It was found later that he was about \$30,000 short in his accounts. He had been living here several weeks with a woman and little girl who were thought to be his wife and daughter, though it is said his wife is dead. Pinkham had been dissipating and it is said his downfall was due to wine, women and automobiles.

HENEY ENJOYS RESTFUL NIGHT

San Francisco, Nov. 17.—A statement issued by the doctors in attendance on Francis J. Heney this morning stated that the patient passed a restful night and was feeling much better. He had withstood the shock of the operation successfully, and was getting stronger with every hour. The doctors will not trust themselves to make too sanguine a statement. It is the opinion that it will not be more than three weeks before the prosecutor will be a well man, and not more than five weeks before he will be able to resume his work in the courtroom.

The patient's condition is very satisfactory. There is absolutely no sign of septicemia about the wound which is perfectly clean and healthy. The physicians say it will remain so unless something extraordinary happens.

The muscles of the larynx, through which the bullet passed, are regaining their normal condition, and it is likely that no trouble with his speech will bother Mr. Heney when he recovers.

MAKE COMPANY TAKE FRANCHISE

Councilman Vaughn Wants P. R., L. & P. Co. to Accept Peninsula Privilege.

The feature of the special session of the council held yesterday afternoon to consider various franchise applications, was the declaration of Councilman Vaughn that he would not vote for any of the franchises applied for by the Portland Railway, Light & Power company until that company had first accepted the franchise offered it for a route to the new packhouse district.

Mr. Vaughn's remarks were addressed to F. J. Fuller, general manager of the company, and F. V. Holman, its chief counsel.

After your company accept a franchise on the most favorable terms, granting you the right to build a line to the packhouse plant, the franchise is given without including the others you ask for on numerous streets? asked Mr. Vaughn.

After being pressed for a direct answer Mr. Fuller replied that his company would not do so. He said to consider the matter separately would mean the granting of an indefinite number of franchises and that he saw no reason why all these should not be considered at once.

RECEIVED BY MAIL KILLS

Daly Takes Life of Harry Kenny, Who Is Shot Down in Own Saloon and Dies in Hospital—Scarcely Makes Effort to Escape.

Angry at being refused his old position as bartender in the saloon conducted by Harry Kenny on the southeast corner of Sixth and Ankeny streets, Harry Daly, 35 years of age, shot and killed the proprietor last night, apparently in cold blood.

Daly had entered the saloon shortly before 8:30 p. m., and after asking for his old position as bartender, from which he had been discharged, he became angry and disapproving Kenny, who sat at a table playing cards with Thomas Lyons, he shot Kenny from behind the bullet lodging in the shoulder of the wounded man, who fell heavily from his chair to the floor.

Daly backed toward the door, his weapon drawn and aimed toward Charles Miller, a customer, who lives at 54 North Fifth street. Miller remained standing at the bar so overcome by the unexpected shot that he had no thought of making an outcry or attacking the murderer, who was soon run down Ankeny street in the darkness.

Kenny, who was 60 years of age, was removed to the Good Samaritan hospital, where his wounds were dressed and where he died shortly after 1 o'clock this morning from the shock. An examination proved that the lungs had not been punctured by the bullet and that no arteries had been broken by the course of the shot. Kenny leaves a widow and family on the east side.

Several pedestrians heard the report of the shot and hurried to the saloon but paid no attention to Daly, who is a cripple, as he backed out of the door.

Arrested in Blazier's.

The murderer was found by Sergeant of Police Goltz and Policeman Small in Blazier's saloon at Ninth and Davis streets, but remained there only a few minutes, returning to the streets and making his way to the saloon where he was apprehended by the police. He barely escaped Constable Wagner and Constable Smith, who entered his room shortly after the shooting.

Although Kenny died at 1 o'clock last night, the coroner was not notified until this morning. Lyons and Miller, who were the only witnesses, have been subpoenaed to appear at the inquest at 10 o'clock tomorrow.

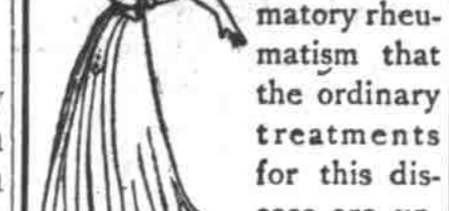
