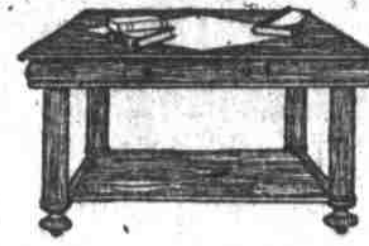
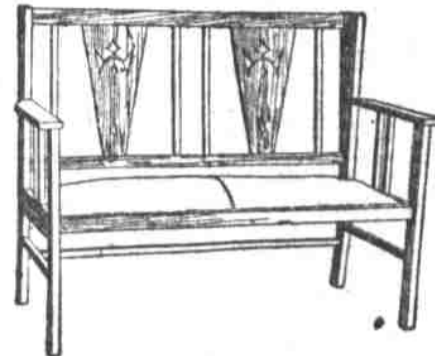
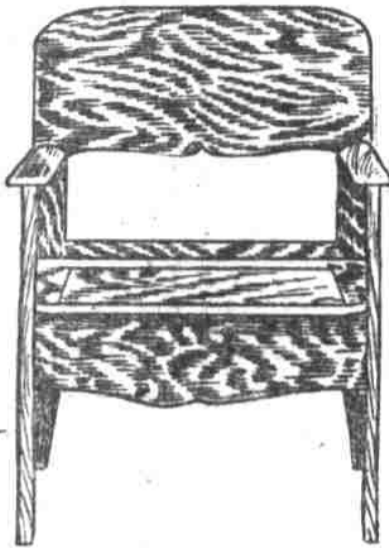

MORNING DAILY FOR DEMOCRACY

Five Capitalists Ready to Put the Paper on Its Feet, in Chicago.

 Chicago, Nov. 18.—Indefinite plans were announced today for the establishment of a Democratic morning newspaper in this city, according to the assertions of prominent Democrats, five capitalists have been found who have agreed to stand an annual loss of \$25,000 each for two years. This would give the paper ten years in which to become firmly established.
 The need of a Democratic daily is admitted here by Democrats. The chief objection at the present time is that the unsettled condition of the party has caused several of the men who are prospecting the paper to desire its control.
 Democratic leaders, however, predict that this obstacle will be overcome and in the near future there will be a morning paper of Democratic doctrine in the windy city.

 Albany, Or., Nov. 18.—George C. Cooley, 77 years of age, one of the oldest pioneers of Linn county, died this morning at his home in Brownsville. Mr. Cooley was born in Virginia. He crossed the plains fifty years ago and settled in Brownsville where he engaged in the mercantile business, remaining until his death. He was the pioneer merchant of that city.
 Mr. Cooley was one of the valley's best known men, always honest and straightforward in his dealings. His death will cause sorrow among his many friends and acquaintances.
 The deceased is survived by his wife, Mrs. Harriet Cooley; two sons, W. C. Cooley and J. B. Cooley of Brownsville; four daughters, Mrs. J. D. Irvine, Mrs. W. B. Bailey, Mrs. George W. Wright of this city; Mrs. Homer Drinkard of Elmira, Wash.

PACIFIC COAST ELECTRIC LINE

Franchise Application at Chehalis Said to Be Part of General Plan.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
 Chehalis, Wash., Nov. 18.—W. J. Pattison and A. Welch have applied for a franchise to operate a street railroad through certain streets of this city. They ask for a fifty-year franchise and agree to begin work on the line within six months after it has been granted. After the sixth year they agree to pay the city \$50 per year for twenty years; for the remainder of the life of the franchise \$500 per year.
 It is stated that the securing of the franchise here is but a part of a plan to link up the Pacific northwest with an electric system. It is said to be the intention of the company to continue south toward Portland as fast as the right of way can be secured. The same men who are applying for a franchise here have made application to the city of Centralia, the purpose being to connect the two cities, which are only four miles apart.

OIL KING DIGS UP DOCUMENTS

Coached by Attorney So He May Be Fixed for Muckrakers.

Rockefeller is spending his time reading old letters and documents on file in his office to refresh his memory so that when he takes the stand in the hearing now on before the federal court he will be able to answer something else than "I don't remember" or "I don't know."
 Morris Rosenthal, who is directing the defense in the Standard Oil trial, has been absent from the hearings for some time and is said to be coaching Mr. Rockefeller so that he can answer the questions asked him correctly.
 Rockefeller will be asked concerning the alleged war that was waged by the Standard Oil company on its competitors in Ohio when all the other concerns went down and left the Standard alone.

SIMPLE LIFE FOR OBERLIN M. CARTER
