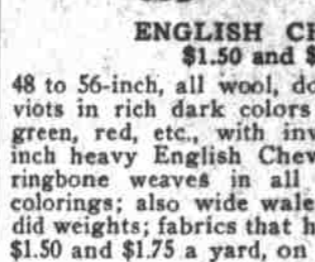

HARRY TABOR'S FATE WITH JURY

Family Feud Is Brought Out by Evidence at Murder Trial.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Eugene, Or., Nov. 19.—The trial of Harry Tabor, charged with manslaughter by the grand jury in the killing of Harry Stuckey at Deadwood, in the western end of Lane county, October 3, was completed late yesterday afternoon and the case went to the jury last night.

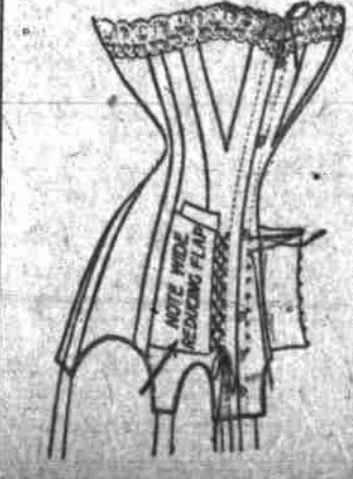

ty, nearly all of whom were acquaintances of Tabor and Stuckey.

The evidence brought out the story of a feud that had existed between the Stuckey and Tabor families for over a year. It was shown that Stuckey had created trouble among several families aside from Tabor's. The trouble which led up to his killing seems to have originated from Stuckey's acquaintance with the wife of G. W. Steinhauer.

On the day of the shooting, according to the evidence, Stuckey and his wife were going through Tabor's field on their way to the postoffice to cash a money order. Tabor saw them approaching and ordered them off. Stuckey said something to the effect that "Tabor could put him off if he wanted to and continued to approach Tabor. Tabor swore on the witness-stand that Stuckey reached in his pocket for his gun, but that he (Tabor) was too quick for him,

and fired at him at a distance of 14 feet away. Mrs. Stuckey said her husband made no attempt to draw his gun. Thirty or 40 witnesses from the vicinity where the Stuckeys and Tabor live testified as to the good character and reputation of Tabor, while each one of them stated that Stuckey's reputation was bad and that he had a vicious temper.

Deputy Prosecuting Attorney G. F. Shipworth conducted the prosecution and was assisted by Attorney Blyden W. S. McFadden, J. H. Williams and L. E. Bean appeared as counsel for Tabor.

(Continued from Page One.) houses for the shipping of oil to foreign countries.

To Control Facilities. "Then your entire policy simply indicated a desire to control your own facilities?" he was asked.

Replying to a question as to the condition of the Standard's affairs after 1870 and 1871, Rockefeller said: "In the oil business, as in the refining business, came a commensurate decrease in the profit per gallon but we expanded our interests and increased our output and this enabled us to maintain a very good profit at all times."

Referring to the accusation that he had associated in his oil business with Rockefeller, he said that he felt the result of speculation. "I remember distinctly being told by capitalists," he said, "that they were fearful of investment in the oil industry at that time. The attention of these and others made it extremely difficult to obtain the money desired for the extension of our business."

Paid Part in Stock. "We paid for the industries absorbed by our company partly by purchase and partly by stock in the Standard Oil company. They were fair negotiations; the kind of negotiations I have always made."

ATTORNEYS MUST CUT OUT ABUSE

Judge Lawlor Lays Down Ultimatum to Court Room Wranglers.

(United Press Lined Wire.) San Francisco, Cal., Nov. 19.—Bitter personalities between Attorney Henry Ach, for Ruff, and the attorneys for the prosecution marked the beginning of the trial today. The verbal encounter was cut short by Judge Lawlor, who declared that he would not tolerate further indulgence in personalities by either side and that he would take measures to prevent their recurrence.

The quarrel arose over questions propounded to "Big Jim" Gallagher, chief of the bonding board of supervisors and star witness for the people against Ruff, as to the details of the signing of the immunity contract between Rudolph Spreckels and the members of the bonding board.

Attorney Hiram Johnson objected to the questions as calculated to waste time. Ach replied that he was asking the questions to save time.

"That Law like Satan rebuking sin," declared Attorney Johnson, looking squarely at Ach. "We can show the court that this very question just asked the witness was asked and answered five questions ago and we can show the court that the counsel for the defense has asked such questions time and time again for the very purpose of delaying this trial, dishonorably, by this court."

"Special Counsel" Offensive. "I take an exception to the remarks of the special counsel," declared Ach, "and—"

"I want to say right here," interrupted Attorney Matthew I. Sullivan, for the people, "that while we are on this subject we object to being designated by counsel for the other side as 'special counsel' and 'special prosecutors.' We are here for the people of the state of California with the concurrence of the district attorney and that of the whole people of California. If counsel insists upon making personal remarks, I suggest that the court administer a little contempt medicine."

Ach started to reply but the court cut him short with the admonition: "That is all I care to hear. The court asks for the opinions of counsel on questions of law and there has been too much indulgence in the personal attacks in this discussion. It must not be done and will be tolerated no more by this court."

Attorney J. J. Ewyer, for the prosecution, asked the court if the attorneys for the people were not to be allowed to defend themselves from personal attacks, and the court directed that the examination of the witness proceed.

Judge Lawlor declared that the attorneys for Ruff would be permitted to ask questions as to the details of the signing of the immunity contracts, subject to motions by the prosecution to strike out.

"Big Jim's" Motives Immune. The court rebuked Attorney Ach severely when he asked later in the day to have the court instruct the witness Gallagher to answer his questions categorically, without comment.

Ach spent the entire morning session in trying to get from Gallagher his motives for accepting the immunity contract from Rudolph Spreckels, and Judge Lawlor finally directed him that he could not inquire into Gallagher's motives for entering into the immunity contract.
