

COMPOSITE TEAM OF SCHOOL'S PLAYERS

COACHES SELECT IDEAL ALL-STAR TEAM

According to custom The Journal today presents its composite all-star interscholastic football team selected by the five coaches of the five different eleven in the city school league. The players have all performed consistently this season and the knowing in today's closing game between West Side and Portland academy will have no result on the final choice. Each coach was asked to pick 11 men after close study of their play without considering his own charges, and the eleven is the authoritative one for 1908.

This year there were but two conflicts as to choice, Smith and Ford being chosen as one tackle, while Ennis and Jones were tied with three votes each for the position of halfback. In deciding the men who should have the two contested positions in the first lineup of a theoretical game The Journal has taken into consideration every known quality the two men possess and it believes that the choice of Ennis as right halfback and Smith as left tackle on the all-star will be a just as well as a popular one.

Ennis is undoubtedly the best half in the league when it comes to playing the new game. He is better than the average punter, fine at running in punts, good at passing and uses his head well in picking out holes in the line. Jones is a sterling player and is probably a better punter than Ennis, but has not the ground-gaining ability which Ennis possesses.

Smith is Best Kicker.

Smith chosen as tackle more for his ability to kick off and punt than anything else. He and Ford, who was his competitor for this place, are about a standoff when it comes to playing the tackle position and in carrying the ball in tackle around tackle plays, but Smith is a better kicker than the Hill man. This team needs a couple of good kickers and Smith and Ennis are just the men.

One surprise to many interscholastic followers is the picking of Walker at fullback instead of Donason of Hill. Donson is a great line plunger, but the opinion of the coaches seemed to be that he lacked head work. While Walker is not quite the line bucker that Donson is he has played a fine defensive game for the Columbia team and has shown good head work in handling his team.

Walker is much faster than Donason and keeps his feet much longer. The Columbia lad received two votes for captain of the team.

Ann Cornell, East Side High school's gritty little quarterback, is the captain and quarterback of this year's team and it is doubtful whether there is a more deserving player in the league than the little fellow. He is probably the best safety in the league for there has not been a man this season who has been able to pass him on an open play. There has not been a touchdown scored on East Side this season on a run of more than eight yards. High School's score in the last half of the game between East Side and West Side being the longest. Only perfect interference kept him from nailing Gunnell, the West Side back, on that play.

Pair of Open Field Runners.

There are not a better pair of open field runners in the league than Cornell and Ennis and a team with two such men as these playing back for punts would be dangerous at all times. Both are exceptionally fast men and good dodgers. Cornell can gain more ground after being tackled than any other man in the league. He is as slippery as an eel and will often times gain three or four yards after being caught.

A real football fan could go sleepless for nights at a time thinking of the fast football which this team would be able to put up.

Imagine Ennis working the forward pass with two such good men as Campbell and Ludlum to receive. Think of the smashing line bucks which Hill and Walker would be able to dish up. How would Ennis and Cornell skirting the ends and Leader and Smith carrying the ball in tackle plays, look? Then should these plays fall imagine two ends of the sterling quality of Ludlum and Campbell working together on punts with Smith and Ennis doing the kicking. These two men, with the wonderful ability which W. Graham and Walker have shown in getting down on punts, would be able to win many games. Probably a more ideal all-star team has never been selected than the one which the coaches have picked this year.

Graham, Leader, Jamison, Smith and Hare are all good line men who have shown marked ability this year. They are all well built men, not too heavy to lack speed but still having enough weight to make them strong both on offense and defense.
