

ROYEY DATES CANCELLED STATE

Y. M. C. A. Director Says Question of Boys' Ages Never Occurred When He Engaged Singers to Appear Here.

The Roney boys, under the management of Henry B. Roney, of Chicago, booked for a concert in Portland December 14 and whose appearance is barred by the child labor law, will not show here under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A. as had been arranged. The officials of the association have canceled the contract.

But even though the contract was called off several days ago, individuals have interested themselves in the matter and have appealed to the juvenile court officials and to Superintendent Rigler of the public schools. These persons still have hopes that while the Roney boys are in this section of the country arrangements may possibly yet be made whereby a concert might be given here.

The following letter to Mrs. Trumbull, written by W. S. Hale, director of the boys' department of the association, explains the view of the Y. M. C. A.

Your letter at hand, and in answer will say that at the time we made the contract for the appearance of the Roney boys under our auspices, the matter of the boys' ages never entered my mind, but, under the circumstances, we will at once cancel the engagement.

We do not wish to do anything contrary to the child labor law but on the other hand we wish to do all in our power to further the good work of the law, and will stand ready to help any movement that stands for the betterment of humanity.

The boys are dated to appear in Vancouver, Wash., and will probably spend a day here, but no arrangements had also been made for concerts at The Dalles, Pendleton, McNamara and several other places in eastern Oregon. All these dates, too, will have to be canceled on account of the state child labor law.

BRYAN CENSOR OF STATE LEGISLATURE

FALSE REPORTS SPREAD RELATIVE TO THE PLAGUE

San Francisco, Nov. 21.—So much discussion has arisen over the plague conditions on the coast that a special correspondent of this paper on the coast called upon Dr. Rupert Blue, quarantine officer at San Francisco, to see what the facts were. Dr. Blue gave some astonishing figures which show that the condition is not nearly so serious as has been generally supposed.

He states that in San Francisco not a case of the plague among human beings has occurred since January 30, 1908. From May, 1907, to January 30, 1908, 150 human cases were reported with 77 deaths. 400 plague rats have been found since these were very numerous until March, 1908. There was one infected rat in April, one in May, one in June and one on July 18. From that time until October 21 no infected rats were found. One infected rat was found on October 21 and one on October 23, 1908. The rats found in April, May, June and July all came from one place. The two rats found in October were taken about nine and one-half blocks from this focus, so that it may be said that there has only been one focus of plague in San Francisco since last April.

The city of San Francisco has undergone a very thorough cleaning at the hands of the United States public health and marine hospital service and was never in such a cleanly condition as at present. The work is still being carried forward, the United States government spending about \$20,000 per month.

There were 13 human cases, with eight deaths, in Oakland. Active measures are being taken in Los Angeles by the federal and local health authorities, and no trouble is expected from this source. The infection has been discovered among the ground squirrels in Contra Costa county. The one case which occurred in Los Angeles was infected from the bite of a ground squirrel. The fact that the infection is among the squirrels is the most serious aspect of the question and may require heroic eradication measures.

The entire campaign has been under the direction of the United States public health and marine hospital service, of which General Walter Wyman is the head. The state board of health deserves the very greatest praise for its cooperation in this campaign. In San Francisco the city government and the city board of health did splendid work with the assistance of the citizens' health committee, which was organized for the specific purpose of educating the people and combating the disease. The city of Oakland also did good work.

It has long been recognized that the federal health service was best fitted for handling problems of this kind, and this campaign has simply demonstrated again that it is not only safe, but necessary, to delegate this work to the United States public health and marine hospital service.

YOUNG WOMAN TRIES TO TAKE OWN LIFE

(Herald News by Longest Leased Wire.) Washington, D. C., Nov. 21.—Mystery surrounds the case of a handsomely dressed woman, believed to be Miss Sadie Hutchins of San Francisco, who is thought to be dying in the Emergency hospital from the effects of poison. The doctors say she is evidently suicidal.

Coming from the effects of an unusually large dose of morphine or opium, Miss Hutchins was found shortly after 11 o'clock this morning in her room on the third floor of the Buckingham hotel, where she registered last night. One of the maids made several unsuccessful attempts to get into the room by failing to get a response after rapping on the door for a long time.

Honeymoon in Snowstorm

An unusual honeymoon, filled with hardship and suffering, was the lot of Mr. and Mrs. George Fitting on Manitou, who returned Saturday from the White River country after a week of frightful experiences. The young couple went on a hunt and were caught in a storm. For more than a week they ploughed their way through snow three feet deep. They were finally rescued by a party of men making their way into New Castle, Colo. Fitting is the sister of Lila Harris, the capitalist, and is accounted the most beautiful bride seen this season in Manitou. She was wedded secretly at a small town in Iowa and the party came west to spend last honeymoon.

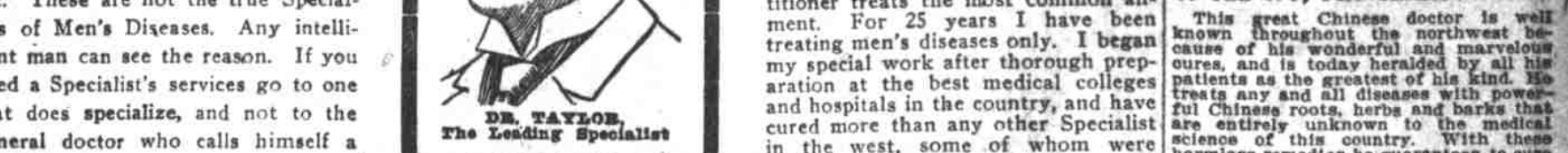
