WEATHER REPORT

A small disturbance of considerable energy is central over Vancouver island, with cause high, south to southeast winds today and probably tonight in western Washington, and warnings were ordered at 10 a. m. at all airports in Washington and at the mouth of the Columbia river. Another disturbance is moving from the south over western Oklahoma. A high pressure area overlies the Atlantic states, and the barometric is relatively high over southern California. Moderately heavy rains have fallen on the Pacific slope as far south as San Diego, and rain has been reported at several places in the Mississippi valley and lower Mississippi valleys. The temperatures are above normal nearly everywhere in the United States, and they are decidedly above normal in the Mississippi and lower Mississippi valleys. The indications are for rain in this district tonight and Tuesday.
