QUIET TIP TO PLACATE JAPS

Acting on Which San Francisco Supervisors Proceeded to Break Law.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Nov. 24.—Apologetic explanations have followed yesterday's disclosure of the fact that five Japanese had been granted liquor licenses by the police commission in direct violation of the city ordinance.

The charge that five Japanese subjects, restaurant keepers in the western addition, were selling liquor without license, in direct and open violation of the law forbidding the sale of liquor by aliens, was made by Captain Richmond Pearson Hobson, who also made public an appeal to the president to retain the battleship fleet in the Pacific ocean.

Hobson said the Japanese consul general in this city. Inquiry disclosed the fact that the police commission last June agreed to "accept" applications for permits to the total number of five from Japanese, to open and conduct restaurants and sell liquor therein, on condition that the said applications were granted, no liquor would be sold to other Japanese or to females.

"I am sorry this has gained publicity," said the mayor. "It is a matter that should not become the subject of controversy and was not in advance of the action of the police commission, but I believe that under the circumstances it was a wise thing to do."
