

AMBITION OF BEACH IS FEARED

Fulton Men Suspect That State Senator Is Secretly Working to Secure Presidency of Senate, for Which Jay Bowerman Is Slated.

Politicians here in Portland who are following plans for the organization of the legislature and the senatorial fight are looking with a good deal of interest upon the tour of State Senator Seneca C. Beach through eastern Oregon. They are wondering how the Multnomah senator will explain himself to Senator Fulton, Jay Bowerman of Condon and the close friends and allies of both when the time comes for such explanation. Political gossip says it is apparently Mr. Beach is not keeping faith with Mr. Fulton and Mr. Bowerman, particularly with the latter. Senator Beach, according to the political "dope sheet," is the Fulton heir apparent to the presidency of the Oregon senate. That is the understanding of Senator Fulton, of Bowerman and of the Fulton contingent everywhere. Senator Bowerman is to be put in the president's chair if Fulton influence can accomplish that end.

The Fulton plan of battle also provides for a caucus on the organization of the house and senate, the breaking down of the Statement No. 1 majority in the joint assembly and securing a majority of the joint assembly on the senatorial question.

Senator Beach is the general who is to take active charge of the fight to bring these things about. He is to line up the anti-statement members of the house and senate for organization of the two houses, and secure some Statement No. 1 men to go into caucus on the organization. He is also to plan for the joint caucus on the senatorship and to see to it that there are some eight or nine Statement No. 1 men willing to go into the caucus when it is ready to be held.

This is the work which has been mapped out for Senator Beach by Senator Fulton, a pretty big task, but Senator Beach has a reputation as a fighter.

Senator Beach, however, is going a little beyond the program. While he is attempting to line up the senators for a caucus on the organization, he is also trying to teach them how to vote for Beach for president of the senate. Beach has wanted to be president of the senate for some time. He believes that this is the time for him to win. Anyway, he is going into the fight, disregarding the fact that Fulton has set the stamp of his approval upon Bowerman.

How this will affect the game is a matter of supposition. Some say that it will cause soreness and that it will split up the Fulton forces and weaken them. Nobody who is not boosting for Beach seems greatly enamored of Beach's methods.

WANT UTILITIES SECTION MORE CLEAR

The charter revision committee of the United East Side Push clubs last night passed a resolution asking that the "general utilities" passage in the new city charter be made more clear and that a provision be made that the city council can authorize a bond issue up to \$100,000 for any general utility without putting it to a vote of the people. Judge M. G. Munly introduced the resolution.

Numerous other resolutions were introduced, most of them covering various phases of the street repair and building question, and also recommending that the city own and operate a rock crusher. Chairman Rice was appointed a committee of one to see that the resolutions reached the charter board.

FAILS TO GET PERPETUAL RIGHT

Street Railway, However, Will Apparently Get Franchise From the Council.

Preliminary consideration of the franchise ordinance submitted by the Portland Railway, Light & Power company was finished yesterday afternoon by the council. The ordinance was referred to the city attorney to be checked up and returned with a few minor amendments. With few exceptions the railway's dictum was taken on every section of the franchise.

The introduction by Councilman Kellaher of an amendment providing a common user clause was greeted with hostile glances, and in the debate which preceded the formality of voting down Kellaher's resolution Vaughn and Baker came together with the usual clash.

Baker, in answering Vaughn's appeal for more regulations for the railway company, declared that just such obstructions as Vaughn, Kellaher and Mayor Lane had kept Portland from going ahead, and that these men could not point with pride to a single action of theirs which had helped to build up the city.

Vaughn Replies to Baker. Councilman Vaughn for once had the sympathy of the galleries. He held that if it was right and fair to put in common user clauses in the franchise of the Oregon Electric, O. W. P., Mount Hood and other railways, that it is right to hold the Portland Railway, Light & Power company to the same regulation. "I can point with pride to this thing, Mr. Baker," cried the big councilman. "I have always stood for a square deal to everybody. No man can show me where I have ever made fish of one and flesh of the other. I fight out my battles on the floor of this council, too, and not in the newspapers."

Councilman Kellaher paid particular attention to Attorney Holman in making his effort to secure the common user clause. The railway attorney had insisted all along that the charter should be followed in making out the franchise. "Now, don't dodge the issue," he shouted. "The charter requires that all franchises shall have a common user clause."

Attorney Holman contends that his road is not a commercial railway and therefore does not come under the charter provision for common users. The matter was referred to City Attorney Kavanaugh who will make a report, and if it is found that the local corporation is not a commercial road the question will again be threshed out. There is little likelihood, however, that the railway company will lose out, judging from the attitude of its supporters.

REFUSES \$31,000 FOR HALF BLOCK

Gold Medal Shingle Co. Declines Offer on Property Costing but \$18,000.

That Portland is a good field for investment is evident to every investor in real estate. A few days ago The Journal announced the purchase of a half block facing on East Taylor street between East First and East Second streets by the Gold Medal Shingle company from the Western Electrical company for \$18,000. The purchasers and Fisher, Thorsen & Co., who own the other half block, being block 55, East Portland, refused a cash offer of \$55,000 for the whole block last Monday, and yesterday the Gold Medal Shingle company refused a cash offer of \$31,000 from Fisher, Thorsen & Co. for its half block which they paid but \$18,000 for two weeks ago. Fisher, Thorsen & Co. intend erecting a three story concrete building on their half block to cost \$65,000. The Gold Medal Shingle company figures that its property will be greatly enhanced in value.
