GRANGE UPHOLDS CASE IN OREGON

National Body Declares Its Sympathy in Direct Legislation Fight Here.

The national grange in its recent session took a strong position in favor of direct legislation, and particularly with reference to the suit now pending in which the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company seeks to overthrow the initiative and referendum in this state. The grange has consistently favored all conservative plans of popular governmental models, including direct legislation, the primary laws and popular election of senator. The ideas of the national organization with respect to direct legislation and the Oregon case are set forth in the following resolutions, adopted in the recent session at Washington, D. C.: "Whereas, The effective means of direct legislation through the initiative and referendum in throwing machine influence and its value in maintaining the truly representative character of our form of government has been demonstrated wherever it has been tried; "Whereas, This system is becoming a part of the fundamental law of an increasing number of commonwealths through state constitutional amendments; and "Whereas, One of the great corporations of the United States is seeking through the United States supreme court to completely destroy this safeguard of the liberties of the people; and "Whereas, The state grange of Oregon is leading in the fight to maintain in the courts the right of self-government for the people of this nation; therefore, be it "Resolved, That the national grange in its forty-second annual session assembled, hereby declares its earnest sympathy with the people of Oregon and of other states which have this system in their state constitutions in their struggle for its preservation and give it our moral support."

SAYS PAIR ARE SAFE-CRACKERS

C. A. Johns, a man about 45 years of age, and Just Johnson, a 17 year old boy who says he comes from Stockholm, Sweden, were arrested yesterday by Detective Tom Coleman at First and Madison streets and charged at the police station with vagrancy. The man and the boy have been rooming together but have frequently been away for a day or two at a time and the officers say that the disappearances are usually coincidental with the cracking of some safe. PULLS GUN WHEN INSULT RESENTED

O'Brien and hooked at the police station on the charge of carrying concealed weapons, but a more serious complaint may be made against him before he gets out of his present troubles. Just before he was arrested he had insulted two ladies, sisters of Lou Riggs, at 269 1/2 Front street. When Riggs, angered at this, called him down, Angelus Trokus drew a revolver and threatened to shoot Riggs. That was about the time the officer appeared on the scene of action and took charge of Angelus and the gun.

JAPANESE SLAVERS ADMITTED TO BAIL

(United Press Leased Wire.) Seattle, Wash., Nov. 26.—With the consent of the government, S. Ishikawa, K. Katayama, S. Minama and his wife, H. Minama, the Japanese arrested with Captain T. R. Gawley, charged with illegally bringing Japanese women into the United States, have been admitted to bail in the sum of \$1000 each, with the exception of Mrs. Minama, whose bond was fixed at \$500. The case of Captain Gawley is set for hearing tomorrow before Commissioner Armstrong.

WIDOW ACCUSED OF KILLING HUSBAND

(United Press Leased Wire.) Paris, Nov. 26.—Madame Adolph Steinhilf, widow of the artist, who was murdered in his studio last May, was arrested today by the police charged with being an accomplice in the crime. Madame Steinhilf denies her guilt. The accused woman recently issued a statement in which she declared that Alexander Wolff, a son of her former cook, killed her husband for the purpose of robbery. She maintained that she had been frightened into keeping her knowledge a secret. The issuance of the statement caused her arrest by the authorities. Wolff was subsequently arrested and his mother and sister are being detained as witnesses. Romy Couillard, a chauffeur, who was taken into custody because a pearl belonging to the murdered man was found in his possession, was later released.
