

CABRERA RULES WITH IRON HAND

Former Honduran Secretary Makes Appeal in Name of Humanity.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
 San Francisco, Nov. 27.—An appeal to the civility for the suppression of the atrocities charged against Manuel Cabrera, the Guatemalan president, made by Dr. Fornes Diaz, former Honduran secretary of state, has been made public by a friend of Diaz. The translation of the appeal, which was first issued in "La Republica," of San Jose, Costa Rica, begins:
 "I make a general appeal to all honest men in the world, to those who feel justice, hate crime and feel in their hearts commiseration for our Guatemalan brethren—to all these appeal today in order that the tyranny which now prevails on Guatemalan soil may be ended, in the name of humanity and civilization."
 After referring to the wholesale assassinations alleged to have been ordered by Cabrera, Dr. Diaz recites the case of John Binelli, an Italian subject, who was poisoned by the jealous Cabrera, according to Diaz.
 Diaz charges that Cabrera became jealous of Binelli because of a woman's love for the Italian. He ordered Binelli confined in a Guatemalan dungeon on a spurious charge and then slowly poisoned him to death.
 Dr. Diaz declares that his charges are the outgrowth of personal knowledge of the facts in the particular case. He was confined for several months as a political prisoner in a cell next to that of Binelli, and he learned the latter's story.

HAD NEVER BEEN KISSED BY WOMAN

 Mount Vernon, Ill., Nov. 27.—Boasting that he has never been kissed by a woman, John McClain, 70 years old, left for New York today and will sail for Scotland, where he will wed his 60-year-old sweetheart, who has been waiting for him since she was 15.
 McClain, when talking of matrimony, said there were two times in a man's life when he would marry—when he was too young to know better and when he was old enough to have better sense.
 He has made six trips to see his sweetheart. He never had but one companion, Russell Dewey, of Mount Vernon, and the friendship between these two old men was the subject of a Phytisias order. McClain is a typical bachelor and since he was a boy has lived alone and done all his own housework.

DR. PEARSONS HAS PLENTY FOR SCHOOLS

 Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 27.—Declaring that the report that he is \$450,000 in debt is "all boosh," Dr. E. K. Pearsons, the Chicago philanthropist, is here laying plans for the distribution of \$3,000,000 more among colleges in the United States.
 Dr. Pearsons has already pledged \$450,000 to be given away immediately and will not undertake to distribute the larger sum until July.
 He has decided to adopt the Carnegie plan and when the \$3,000,000 is given away it will be on condition that the schools endowed raise a similar amount.

Death Roll of the Northwest



Dewitt Clinton Coleman.

 Enterprise, Or., Nov. 27.—Dewitt Clinton Coleman, 80 years of age, who died in Enterprise November 26, was well known in Oregon. He had been a resident of the Pacific coast since the days of '49, when he came out in quest of gold.
 With his brother he crossed the plains to California, arriving in the new El Dorado of the west on August 4. They went to the mines at Hanstown, mined a short time and then started a miners' supply store under the tree, on which some robbers were hung. The hanging gave the town its name. In 1851 D. C. Coleman came to Portland, making only a short stay.
 In 1853 he again came to Portland and opened a general merchandise store. In 1854 he began the erection of the first brick store building in Portland. In 1868 he went to Yamhill county and for one year had charge of the Commercial Flouring mill at McMinnville. In 1876 he went to Sheridan. The town was then just starting and during the years of his residence here he did his part toward advancing its growth and development. He erected several buildings. In 1883 he built the home in which he resided up to 1907, when he went to Enterprise, Or.
 He served several terms as trustee of the peace and as a member of the city council. During President Cleveland's administration he served as postmaster of Sheridan. In 1853 he was married at San Francisco to Miss Mary A. Warren, a native of Boston, and a daughter of William Warren. Three children were

born, the oldest, William W. Warren, is now a resident of San Francisco; the second, Edward, died in his thirtieth year; the daughter died in her second year. In 1888 his wife passed away.
 Seven years later Mr. Coleman married Miss Martha Sargent, a native of Yamhill county. The couple adopted two children, naming them Pearl and Howard.
 Mr. Coleman was made a master Mason in the Sheridan lodge in 1878. He had been prominently identified with the fraternity. He was also a member of the Royal Arch chapter at McMinnville.

ACRES OF WORDS FROM UNCLE SAM'S PRINTERY

 Washington, Nov. 27.—The government printing office was an important factor in the recent presidential campaign. This institution turned out for the Republican and Democratic parties 7,418,700 copies of speeches delivered in congress, surpassing all previous records by 3,000,000 copies.
 The total weight of campaign speeches printed since the beginning of the altright congress exceeds 60,000 or about 14 carloads. The printed sheets would completely cover 45 square acres of ground and if each page could be laid end to end a bicycle track 847 miles long could be obtained.
 The number of words contained in this year's run of speeches has been roughly estimated at 230 billion. With the newspaper calculation of four readers to each copy, this would require the assimilation of nearly a trillion words.
 The printing of speeches in the government printing office for members of the senate and house of representatives has been reduced to an exact science through years of experience. The printing is paid for by the member possessing drawing the requisition, but the mailing is done by frank, at public expense.

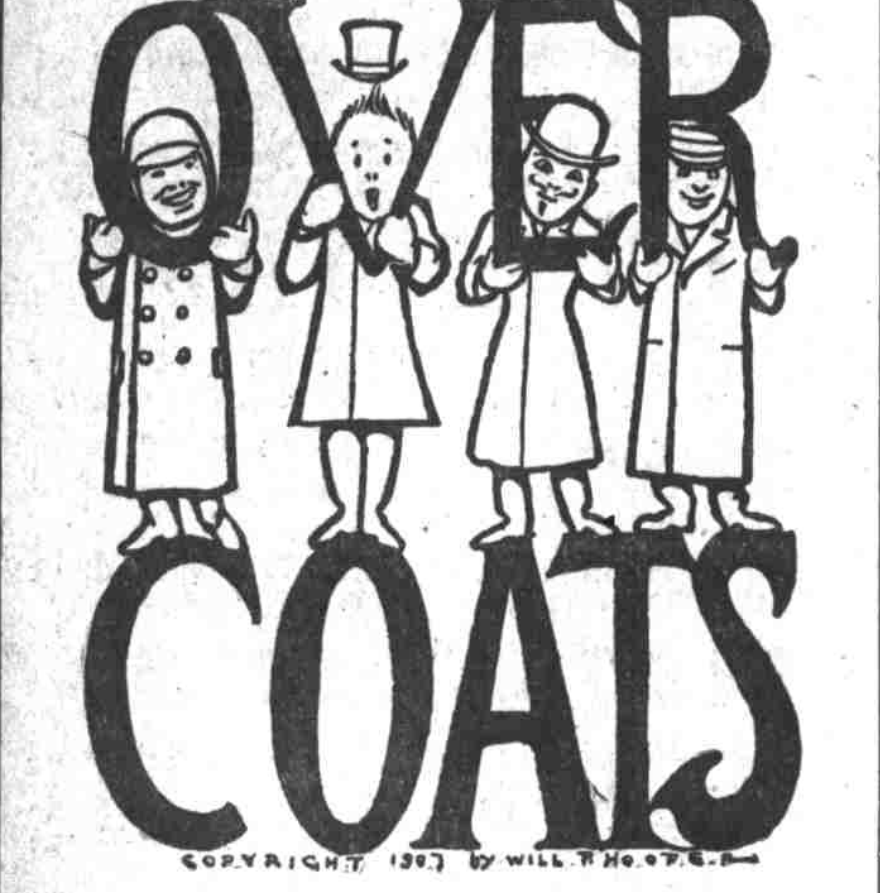
