POLICE FEEL TO SEE JOKE

Arrest Oregon City Man Who Carried Out Mock Highway Robbery.

"I've got you where I want you now. Put up your hands," and Jack Horn leveled his forefinger at Lester, Charles and Henry Nelson in a dark place on the Burnside street bridge last night. The three boys, laborers in a cement factory, were in obedience to the command and the threat of the pointed finger.

"Put up your own hands," was the sharp command that followed, and a real revolver in the grasp of Police Sergeant Goitz was shoved into the neck up's face. His hands went up as rapidly as had those of his intended victims.

The three boys, laborers in a cement factory, were crossing the Burnside street bridge about 12:30 last night, when one of them suddenly felt that some one was following them. He looked back and saw a man slipping silently along in the darkness. He was evidently following them. Seeing that he was discovered, and also that the three had reached a dark place on the bridge, he stepped up to the neck up's face. His hands went up as rapidly as had those of his intended victims.

While the four were standing there in that melodramatic attitude, three of them with their hands held high over their heads, and the fourth pointing an imaginary gun at them, a streetcar passed. Sergeant Goitz was on the sidewalk, and he called out to the boys, "My God, there's a holdup," he exclaimed, "stop the car," and he swung off. "Now, go on with the car," he roared, and ran back to where the holdup and his prospective victims were standing. Seeing him coming, the robber dropped his outstretched arm and crowded in among the boys to try to make it appear that he was one of them. But Goitz, who was never in trouble before. He is charged with assault with intent to rob, but the fact that he had no gun on him when arrested makes the case a difficult one, especially as he did not ask the men he stuck up for their money.
