

USE NEW BUILDING AND SUBLET PRESENT STORE

Olds, Wortman & King Plan to Occupy New Location on Upper Morrison a Year From Day Construction Begins—What the Billboard Will Tell.

There is no longer any question of the removal, within the next 18 months, of the Olds, Wortman & King department store to a new building that will occupy the entire block bounded by West Park, Tenth, Morrison and Alder streets. In order to allay further inquiry as to the firm's intentions in this respect, a huge billboard has been erected on the Penney block on which the announcement will be made that not later than March 1 next actual construction work will begin on the 200-foot square, five-story building.

As planned at present, the big structure will be completed within 12 months from the date on which construction begins. While Olds, Wortman & King have a lease on their present quarters which has three years yet to run, the rental is so low that no trouble will be had in subletting the buildings, with the probability that a handsome profit will be derived from the subletting.

BLOCKS MAY NOT GO BESIDE TRACK

Streetcar Company Given a Chance to Protest on the Belmont Improvement.

Dan Kellaher has found a new ally. The city executive board was induced last night to refer the Belmont street improvement back to the street committee in order that the Portland Railway, Light & Power company may have a chance to protest against being obliged to lay Belgian blocks on its portion of that street when the rest of the street is to be paved with bitulithic pavement. The Pacific Bridge company has the contract, which amounts to \$86,000. Should the council decide to comply with the railway company's request to be allowed to pave its part of the contract with the same material for which other property owners pay, then new bids will have to be advertised for. In this event the Bridge company might not again be the successful bidder.

STEEL FRAME RISES QUICKLY

Just 10 days' time was required in setting up the steel frame work of the two basement stories and the two stories above ground of the big Meter & Frank building at Sixth and Alder streets. When it is remembered that this is the heaviest steel frame that has ever been used in a Portland building and that heretofore at least five days was required in setting up the frame of one story the rapidity with which this work is being done is little short of marvelous.

A building permit for the Meter & Frank structure was taken out on Wednesday of this week by the Thompson-Starrett company, general contractors. The permit puts the cost of the guiding at \$10,000. This sum, however, does not cover the cost of the elevators, the heating and lighting plants nor the special fire protection apparatus which will add not less than \$200,000 to the cost of the completed structure.

ANOTHER GARAGE READY IN JANUARY
The Covey Motor Car company's new garage at Sixth and Couch streets is nearing completion, and will be ready for occupancy by January 1. This building belongs to E. H. Wemme, as does the one to the east at Sixth and Burnside streets, now occupied by the H. C. Keats Auto company. Both are two story brick buildings and each covers a quarter block. These two buildings cover the half block facing Sixth street, between Burnside and Couch and were built by Mr. Wemme at a total cost of about \$75,000.

700 Sacks of Mail Lost.

New York, Nov. 25.—Seven hundred bags of mail were lost when the Panama liner Finance went down off Sandy Hook Thursday, causing the death of four persons. Outside the loss of life and the ship itself, the loss of the mails is by far the most serious part of the accident. It is doubtful if any of the mail will be recovered. A cargo belonging to the canal commission and valued at \$12,000 was on board.

The entire concrete frame of this structure will be completed within 60 days from the time the first green concrete was run into the basement forms.
