Story of Important Negotiations That Brought About Agreement Between United States and Japan—Russia Saved by America.

(Hearst News by Longest Leased Wire.) Hot Springs, Va., Nov. 28.—It can be stated upon authority that as early as the United States made overtures to the Japanese government for the maintenance of the status quo in Asia, an understanding, the original idea of which contemplated concerted action by the United States, Japan and Great Britain. At that time the defensive alliance between Japan and Great Britain had been formed. The Japanese did not propose a formal alliance, knowing the American tradition against such alliances. It was suggested, however, that the understanding should take the form of a well-understood agreement, which should have the binding force, morally, of a formal treaty. That such a triple alliance or understanding was proposed in a secret that has been carefully guarded up to the present time.

Proposal Through Taft. The proposal by Japan was made through William H. Taft. When Mr. Taft, an secretary of state, had returned to the Philippines islands he stopped in Japan and was received with almost dramatic hospitality by the Japanese government. The emperor showed an interest in the secretary that attracted general attention, for the common sense of the Japanese government and statesmen were eager to relieve the United States of the burden of sovereignty in the Philippines. Mr. Taft had been received at the palace, one of the imperial ministers, Count Katsura, sought a private interview with him.

Speaking for the emperor, this minister announced to the American secretary that the Japanese government desired to enter into an understanding which would include both the United States and Great Britain.

Against His Policy. Mr. Taft pointed out that it was against the fixed policy of the United States to contract such alliances, a fact which Count Katsura did not perfectly understand; that there was no power in the government to make secret treaties of any kind; that the Japanese people by tradition and sentiment were opposed to formal alliances, and that it was out of the question to ask them to change their ways.

Disclaiming all right or inclination to speak for his country, save as the imperial representative, that the United States desired the maintenance of the status quo in the Philippines, and the other equal and fair conditions suggested, and that he felt himself justified in saying that with an American representative, Japanese alliance was not to be thought of, Japan might go ahead and as far as she advanced, she need fear no lack of sympathy and support from the United States.

Called the President. At the end of the conference the Japanese minister prepared a memorandum of the conversation. This was edited by Mr. Taft, who called it the "Hague note" in the archives of the state department now. The president replied, approving the position that Mr. Taft had taken. It is impossible to say at present whether Great Britain was consulted by Japan, or whether the purpose to maintain the open door in China and the final effect of the talk tended toward an understanding to maintain the peace in the Pacific.

December Days of Other Years. The weather bureau has issued a record of the weather conditions prevailing during the months of December for the past 27 years, which shows a mean or normal temperature of 41.7 degrees, while the average precipitation, rain or melted snow, was 2.9 inches. The warmest December for the period covered in the report was that of 1875, when the average was 47.7 degrees, and the coldest was that of 1886, with an average of 31.5 degrees. The highest temperature reached was 65 degrees on December 13, 1886, and the lowest was 3 degrees below, December 23, 1879. Particular attention is directed to the fact that the report is only intended to show the conditions that have prevailed during the December covering a period of 27 years and must not be considered as forecast of the conditions for the coming month.

Austrian Troops Are Panic Stricken. (United Press Leased Wire.) W. W. Wishon Sues for \$742 and Court Awards Him Damages of \$1.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Butte, Mont., Nov. 28.—Technically an even break in the case of W. W. Wishon is the result of the decision rendered by Judge Borquin today in the celebration of the case of W. W. Wishon vs. Miles Finley over an option on the famous Minnie Healy claim, over which arose the Heinze-Amalgamated Copper war. On the first count, which the judge finds for the defendant, on the second count he finds for the plaintiff and assesses damages which look to result in a verdict for the plaintiff. The suit was brought to make Miles Finley pay \$742 for an option on the Minnie Healy claim, and for damages because of his alleged failure to assign the option later to the plaintiff, assignee. In passing upon the first count, the judge says that Mr. Finley had not been fortunate enough to receive \$121,250 from the Boston and Montana company for the option, "after they were expired and worthless," the plaintiff would not have thought that Finley was bound to pay him the \$742.

FIGHT ON SAFETY APPLIANCE

Harriman Men Take Ground It Applies Only to Interstate Lines. (United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Nov. 28.—The Northwestern Pacific railroad, a branch of the Harriman system, running 25 miles north of this city, has determined to fight the constitutionality of the safety appliance act and make the first test of the scope of its effectiveness. Almost all of the railroads are to be brought before United States courts for alleged violations of the act in not having safety couplers on cars, grabbers for the safety of trainmen, and other conveniences to lessen the chances of accidents. The company claims the law does not apply to cars used purely in state traffic.

ROOSEVELT ON YELLOW PERIL

(United Press Leased Wire.) New York, Nov. 28.—President Roosevelt's first contribution to the Outlook since it was announced that he had been made one of the associate editors, was published today in the December number, the topic of the article being "The Awakening of China." The president's article on this movement as "one of the great events of our age" and he cautions the American people to be alert to the commercial or military, by behaving righteously toward the Chinese people. He says in part: "China is awakening. There is increasing contact with foreigners, increasing foreign trade and a growing adoption of modern methods of communication and transportation, while some progress is being made in the industrial and agricultural fields. In consequence of these changes there is now a more or less successful effort to introduce a western type of civilization. This means for the preservation of order is hardly necessary to point out. Much of the progress is due to the efforts of medical missionary work being done and a part of this consists in the introduction and broadcast circulation of the Bible and other religious literature. The awakening of China is one of the great events of our age, and the remedy for the present situation may be in the cultivation and direction of life. Here at home we believe that the popular mind is being educated and that a better and more intelligent people is being formed. The Chinese people, in behaving righteously toward them and by striving to inspire a righteous life among them."

BRYAN HAS A BEAR, TEDDY IS OUTCLASSED

(Galveston Press Leased Wire.) Galveston, Tex., Nov. 28.—William Jennings Bryan, who is after big game in the mountains of Chihuahua, Mexico, had an encounter with a big bear in which he came near losing his life. After the other members of the party had chased and fired upon the bear the animal tumbled over and lay motionless for several minutes. Thinking of the bear dead, Mr. Bryan ran up to the bear, which suddenly swung out its paws and grabbed Mr. Bryan about the waist. Quickly jerking free of his coat, which the bear tore to pieces, Mr. Bryan dealt the brute a blow with the butt end of his gun. By this time other members of the party rushed to the scene and shot the bear. Mr. Bryan was not excited and would not admit he had a close call, saying the bear was mortally wounded and could not possibly have squeezed him, but possibly have three bears had been killed by the party and they give credit to Mr. Bryan for having dispatched all of them, as well as five deer, a mountain lion and other game.
