GOVERNOR GOES TO WASHINGTON TO BUY ROSAMOND AS NICE HOTEL

Accompanied by J. N. Teal, Chamberlain on Way to Conservation Congress.

New Proprietor Soon Learns Reputation of House and Wants Her Money Back.

Governor Chamberlain left for Washington, D. C., this morning to attend the annual river and harbors convention and the annual convention of the national commission for the conservation of the natural resources of the United States. Governor Chamberlain was accompanied by J. N. Teal, who is also a delegate to the two conventions.

Sales Beyond 8c Impossible Today With Some of the Dealers Unloading.

Portland Union Stockyards, Nov. 20.
The improvement promised in the cattle market has materialized and although there were no arrivals of cattle in the yards today the market may be said to be 10 cents above previous figures especially for the better class of stock.

New York, Nov. 30.—Rock Island shares led the stock market trading today and for a time the rest of the list followed. The market opened generally firm to steady, with most shares a fraction higher.

Top Sales at Lower Price.
With all the boosting and false reports of higher prices for hogs, the local market is weaker than at that time in ago. Hogs are being sold at that time cannot be moved at that figure just now. Some of the dealers were saying they were offering these same hogs at 8c and it is stated that during the past few days a sale of a fair sized lot of real good primes has been made at 7 1/2c, and the dealer who sold them was glad to accept the local option.

Shortage Begins to Tell.
Over Sunday there are generally quite liberal arrivals of cattle in the yards but during the week the supply has been in short supply. For that reason livestock commission men are quite confident that the price has safely reached \$1.25 for selected steers with other grades showing a proportionate advance. However, until the sales are actually made the advance cannot be quoted in these columns.

Will Force Flour Higher.
The high price of bluestem wheat, which is used in the making of the best flour in the Pacific northwest, will very likely cause an upward movement in patents before many days have elapsed. The extent of the advance has not yet been figured upon but millers all agree that they will be forced to put the market up because they cannot get the wheat for less.

Liverpool Is Higher.
Liverpool, Nov. 30.—Broomhall says: "Liverpool is strong, due to the Argentine outlook and the official estimate of the exportable surplus of wheat."

Another cent a dozen has been added to the price of eggs in this market. In some quarters the advance is even more than this. While a few days ago the price was 23c a dozen, none are offered under 20c, and it is understood that a sale of 100,000 at 20c may be made in the near future.

Only Slight Demand at This Time.
There is a very slight demand at this time for selected eastern Multnomah and Clackamas potatoes in the south and local grades are quite scarce. Local grades are in small supply with the market very firm for the regular run at 40c a dozen. Strictly fancy, selected, extra, and extra large are a premium over this, but no sales along Front street are selling beyond 40c to 45c.

There is but little wheat being offered at this time, either cash or future delivery and in consequence there was little interest in the market. During the session of the Portland board of trade today, values remain unchanged.

There was a slightly better feeling in the barley market in the south with an advanced price quoted here today. On the Portland board of trade today 300 tons of January-February were sold at \$2.50 a track, there was a fractional decline in oats on the board, one sale of 400 tons being made during the day at \$2.25 for January delivery, track, Portland.
