

AUSTRIA GIVES SERVA WARNING

Must Stop Her Aggressiveness or War Will Be Declared.

(United Press Leased Wire.) London, Dec. 4.—An unconfirmed message was received today from St. Petersburg saying that Austria had issued an ultimatum to Serbia ordering her to stop her aggressiveness on the Serbian frontier under penalty of a declaration of war. Such a move would not surprise London. Despite the constant official denials, it is known here that the Serbian and Montenegrin borders for months. There is a general feeling here that the situation in the Balkans is as serious as ever and that important developments may be expected any day.

BOSNIA ROARS WITH WAR PREPARATIONS

(United Press Leased Wire.) Belgrade, Dec. 4.—Reports today show the situation in Bosnia to have reached a serious stage and active preparations for war are being made.

Eight thousand Hungarian infantry are being landed at Ragusa, a fortified seaport near the Bosnian border, and the country is flooded with military. Another military is reported at Visegrad and throughout Bosnia midnight executions are taking place.

Life in the isolated villages has become almost impossible. Most of the Austrian troops under canvas are suffering from cold and are exhausted because of bad food and extra duty. Discontent prevails everywhere.

AUSTRIAN MINISTER TO TURKEY STAYS

(United Press Leased Wire.) Vienna, Dec. 4.—Emperor Franz Josef today sent a special message to Marquis Pallavicini, Austrian ambassador to Turkey, instructing him not to withdraw from his post in case of a Turkish boycott against Austria.

TRAINS OF RUM; CAN'T CONFISCATE

Official Says Malheur County's Prohibition Law Has Flaws.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Vale, Or., Dec. 4.—That the prohibition system has not proved altogether satisfactory in Malheur county is the opinion of the county officers whose duty it is to enforce the measure. One of the officers of the law states that whiskey of the worst class is being shipped into the county on every train that arrives and that there is no law permitting the officers to break open boxes of goods to see whether or not they contain alcoholic liquors.

ALBANY SHELVES HORSECAR SYSTEM

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Albany, Or., Dec. 4.—This city yesterday shelved its antiquated traction system. The system has consisted of a horsecar, two horses and a driver. It will be superseded by an electric car line, which is expected to be in operation by January 1.

SHOULD ITALY WITHDRAW

Premier and People Not to Be Forced Into Other People's War.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Rome, Dec. 4.—Political circles are agitated by the speech of ex-Premier Fortis to the chamber of deputies yesterday afternoon in which the leader of the majority virtually advocated the withdrawal of Italy from the triple alliance. The feeling of the Italian people today as indicated by their representatives is that if Italy must be dragged into war through the acts of her allies in the alliance then the nation should withdraw.

HAITI WAITS ON GENERAL SIMON

Nothing Doing in Government Till Conquering Hero Comes.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Port Au Prince, Haiti, Dec. 4.—Unless General Simon assumes charge of the affairs of Haiti practical anarchy is likely to prevail for a long time. Quarrels have already divided those at the head of the temporary government under General Legitime, and there is no organization.

The advance guard of General Simon's army entered the city at daybreak, after having been encamped outside since last evening. General Simon is expected to enter the city some time today.

It is understood that the victorious general has determined not to declare his position until after he has held a conference with his supporters.

DUTCH CRUISERS TO MARACAIBO

(United Press Leased Wire.) Willemstad, Dec. 4.—The Dutch battleship Jacob Van Heemskerck returns to port today after having participated with the cruisers Orisland and Griderze in a demonstration along the Venezuelan coast, extending from Porto Cabello to La Guayra. The cruisers are now going to Maracaibo, where a similar demonstration will be made.

COSGROVE MAKES NO IMPROVEMENT

(United Press Leased Wire.) Paso Robles, Cal., Dec. 4.—The condition of Governor-elect Cosgrove of the state is reported to be no better.

GROWERS OBJECT TO RATE RAISE

Salem, Or., Dec. 4.—The Willamette Valley Prune association objects to the proposed increase in rates January 1, on dried prunes, from \$1 per 100 pounds to \$1.10, by the Southern Pacific. In a communication to the railroad commission, the association writes that the prune industry is just beginning to get on its feet since the depression one year ago, but that the increased freight rates will prevent Willamette valley growers from com-

peting with their products in any eastern market.

The Willamette Valley Prune association of Salem declares the proposed increase unreasonable and unjustly discriminatory. "and one which will give the industry a decided setback at a time when it is just beginning to feel that it has a right to exist."

"It is within the writer's recollection when the charge to ship a car of prunes east was but \$200, the minimum capacity being 20,000 pounds. Then the minimum was increased to 30,000, then 40,000, making the cost \$400 a carload. Larger cars were constructed so that now a 100,000 pound car, costing \$1000, is an average, and a 110,000 pound carload is not unusual.

VETERAN RAILWAY MAN RETIRES

San Francisco, Dec. 4.—J. L. Willcutt, a Southern Pacific official of 41 years' service, and the man who has the distinction of being secretary for 20 different companies affiliated with the railroad, will retire within a month, having almost reached his eightieth year. Willcutt entered the employ of the company in 1866, first being secretary for the San Francisco and San Jose railroad, and going in 1870 to the position of secretary of the Southern Pacific, which place he has held ever since.

MRS. ROSE DECICCO TO INSANE ASYLUM

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Salem, Or., Dec. 4.—Mrs. Rose Decicco, who was committed to the penitentiary this week from Multnomah county convicted of assault upon an officer, was transferred to the asylum today, after an examination by Dr. L. E. Griffith of the asylum board of physicians.
