## VIVID FLASHES PLAYED IN SKY

### German Ship Oregon in the Midst of Electrical Hurricane.

### ARRIVES IN HARBOR FROM PERUVIAN PORT

### Captain Shoemaker Reports Strange Experience Off Oregon Coast—Port of Callao Blocked With Vessels Waiting to Discharge Freight.

The German ship Oregon which reached the harbor yesterday afternoon in ballast from Callao, Peru, had an experience off the Oregon coast that those who were on board will not soon forget. She ran into an electric squall the like of which not even Captain Shoemaker had ever before witnessed although he has been to sea for the better part of half a century.

"It was of most remarkable experience," said Captain Shoemaker, when he related the matter yesterday afternoon. "For while it was lightning and thundering, the wind swept along with hurricane force. It was in the day time and yet the flashes of lightning became the more vivid. At times they played through the rigging but no damage was done."

The Oregon was 58 days coming here from the Peruvian port where Captain Shoemaker says shipping is seriously congested because of a car shortage to haul the stuff into the interior. He says there were at least 25 vessels in the harbor waiting to deliver cargoes when the Oregon got away. The Oregon had delivered a cargo of coal and coke. The vessel is under charter to carry wheat from here to Europe and she will begin receiving cargo as soon as the ballast has been discharged at Linton. The Northwestern Warehouse company will furnish the wheat cargo. The Oregon has been here before and was named in honor of the state. She is one of the trimmest windjammers afloat. Captain Shoemaker was here about five years ago on another sailing vessel.

### ABANDON LAUNCHES

California Fishermen's Carelessness Might Cause Serious Damage. The Merchants Exchange of this city received a dispatch this morning from

the exchange at San Francisco to the effect that five crab fishing launches are anchored near the whistling buoy off Humboldt Bay with no one on board.

The launches are considered a menace to navigation and it is requested that coastwise shipping be warned. It is believed that the owners of the launches have gone to favorite fishing grounds in their small boats and that they will eventually return as the sea is comparatively smooth and the weather being clear.

This information was furnished this morning in a wireless message from the Pacific Coast Steamship company's steamer President which reported two miles north of Yaquina Head last night. The wind was light, the sea smooth, temperature 55 and the barometer 29.97.

### POLICE PREVENT CLASH

Longshoremen Factions Continue Warm Competition for Work. A clash between the opposing forces of longshoremen was averted this morning by the appearance of Harbor-master Speler and four police officers at Oak street dock when the steam schooner was to begin discharging freight.

Members of both unions were present and both wanted the work of handling the freight. The matter was settled without trouble, however, members of the old union getting the job. Captain Donaldson had been warned at Astoria by advance agents that if he engaged members of the new union a strike of his sailors would follow but upon arriving here he referred the matter to the owner's agent at the Oak street dock.

### WILL CALL AT MANILA

Liner Minnesota's Route Will Be Extended to Islands. (United Press Leased Wire.) Seattle, Dec. 4.—Announcement has been made by the passenger department of the Great Northern Steamship company that the steamer Minnesota will next year call at Manila on the outbound trip.

The big liner will proceed, as at present, to Yokohama, Kobe, Nagasaki and Shanghai and from the latter port to Manila, thence to Hong Kong, which will remain the oriental terminal port. On the return voyage the Minnesota will proceed direct from Hong Kong to Nagasaki, thence to Kobe, Yokohama and Seattle.

### ALONG THE WATERFRONT.

The steamer Rose City, Captain Kidston, sails for San Francisco at 4 o'clock this afternoon. The steam schooner Carmel, Captain Donaldson, arrived at Oak street dock last night with 600 tons of freight from San Francisco. The freight consists of general merchandise and fire brick. This is the first visit here of the Carmel. She will take lumber for return cargo.

R. W. Schwerin, manager of the Harborman water lines, will be in Portland next week to look over the docking facilities here. At that time it will be decided whether the Coos Bay liner Redwater will henceforth land at Alingworth wharf or the foot of Oak street.

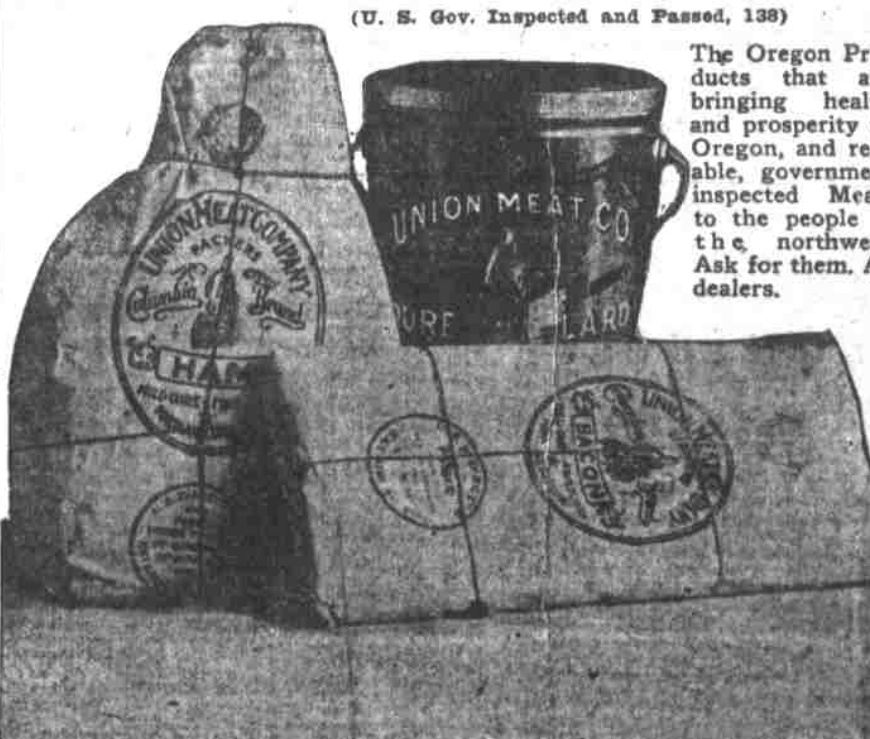

## Compare These Methods of Washing.

The method on the right is the right one. The other is not.

If you use ordinary laundry soap:  
1st. You soak the clothes over night, or for a couple of hours.  
2nd. You rub soap on the soiled parts.
