

PANTON TIRES OF BOARD'S METHODS

Resigns as President of the State Board of Medical Examiners.

"If the people of Oregon knew the actual condition of affairs as regards the great number of incompetent doctors now practicing in this state they would certainly raise a fearful uproar." This is the opinion expressed this morning by Dr. A. C. Pantan, president of the Oregon state board of medical examiners, who has presented his resignation as president of the board, but has been asked to reconsider his action. This morning he stated that he could not remain a member of the board for personal reasons. Although there has been considerable friction among the members of the board, Dr. Pantan says this has nothing to do with his resignation. He intends going south next January, during the period of the annual medical examinations, and could not be in Portland during that time, even if still a member of the board.

Criticizes Incompetents.
The trouble that has arisen, he says, is over the fact that several members of the medical board have insisted in passing all Oregon students and allowing them to practice in the state because they are Oregonians, when they are really incompetent, some of them failing in their examination. "And yet," he says, "they have been allowed to practice, and I hold that the people are entitled to the service of the best physicians and that incapable men should not be admitted to practice. There are more doctors here in proportion to the population than in any other place in the world, and as a result of the passing of incompetent students by the majority of the board of medical examiners, Oregon's students are at present refused the license to practice in 15 different states of the union." Dr. Pantan said that he had been mentioned to fill the vacancy left open by the resignation of Dr. Pantan. They are Dr. Alan Welch Smith, Dr. T. W. Kirby and Dr. W. F. Amos. As the governor is not in town today it could not be ascertained who he has in mind for the appointment.

COMMISSIONERS ON WAY EASTWARD

With an automobile trip over the city and a luncheon at the Commercial club yesterday noon the commission on country life concluded its sessions in Portland and left last night for Spokane, where it will examine the conditions into the lives and conditions of the western farmer. During their trip the commissioners have stopped at the important cities of the Pacific coast, including Los Angeles, San Francisco, Portland and Spokane. They are gradually working their way east by way of the northern wheat growing states and will hold sessions in Dakota and in St. Paul and Minneapolis before returning to Washington. By the time they have completed their circuit they will have acquired first-hand information of every important agricultural section of the country.

Held to Grand Jury.

Jack Howard, charged with larceny in a store, appeared before Acting Judge Seabrook this morning, waived examination, and was held to the grand jury under \$1,000 bail. It is charged that Howard entered the store of the Portland Tent & Awning company and stole some blankets and other things of small value.

CHADWICK WILL SUCCEED ROOT

Governor Accepts Resignation of Washington Supreme Court Justice.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Olympia, Wash., Dec. 4.—Governor Mead has announced his acceptance of Judge Milo A. Root's resignation as a justice of the supreme court and the appointment of Judge Stephen J. Chadwick of Colfax as Judge Root's successor. The governor says he decided upon the appointment of Judge Chadwick to fill out the unexpired term of Judge Root, owing to the fact that Chadwick, as judge-elect, will be able to participate in writing in the decisions of the court as well as hearing the numerous cases that will be argued in the next few weeks. The governor's acknowledgment and acceptance of Judge Root's resignation follows: "Judge Milo A. Root, Seattle, Wash.—Sir: I am in receipt of your letter of the 4th inst. tendering your resignation as a justice of the supreme court. You are hereby notified that your resignation is accepted, and has been placed on file. Respectfully yours, ALBERT E. MEAD, Governor."

POLICEMAN USES TOO MANY SEATS

Complaints are being made by patrons of the Montavilla cars that Policeman "Bill" Sloan, who does patrol duty in Montavilla, takes up too much room in the streetcars. Sloan, who is naturally a very large man, rides out in a Montavilla car every afternoon on his badge, paying no fare. Under the rules, police officers riding on their badges are not supposed to occupy seats when the car is full. But it is complained to the car company that Sloan always occupies two seats, sprawling himself out so that he takes up the room of two ordinary men. A passenger on the car yesterday made a half joking remark about this and claims to have been insulted by Sloan, who said that the passenger "might have more sense when he got older."

TROOPS TO SUBDUE PORTUGUESE WORKMEN

(United Press Leased Wire.) Portimao, Portugal, Dec. 4.—Three regiments are trying to suppress the riot of hundreds of workmen of the numerous sardine canneries of Portimao. Many of the participants have been injured. Women are joining the strikers and are fighting the gendarmes. Experiments in Europe show that balloons traveling at heights of from 500 to 2,000 yards can be hit with a rifle only once in six times, while at an elevation of 3,000 yards they are absolutely safe.

WASCO SUPPORTS CHAMBERLAIN

Legislature-Elects to Stand by Pledge in Senatorial Fight.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) The Dalles, Or., Dec. 4.—It was given out today from a reliable source that both Senator-elect N. J. Sinnott and Representative-elect H. C. Dodds of Wasco county will support George E. Chamberlain for United States senator. Mr. Sinnott has nothing to say about the matter and maintains a sphinx-like silence on the subject when approached, but those in close touch with him say that he will stand by his pledge. It became known today that Jay Bowerman, candidate for president of the senate, had made a special trip to The Dalles in an effort to line Sinnott up, but the senator-elect would commit himself on no point, whether in regard to organization or the election of United States senator. While Representative Dodd will probably support McArthur for the speakership he will not commit himself in regard to the senatorial situation. Dodd was nominated on the anti-senatorial ticket but took Statement No. 1 between the primaries and the June election.

TRANSFER FUNDS OF HIS DIOCESE

Bishop Paddock Is Visiting Bishop Scadding for That Purpose.

Bishop Robert L. Paddock of the missionary diocese of eastern Oregon, is in Portland and is being entertained at Bishopcroft by Bishop Charles S. Scadding. The object of Bishop Paddock's visit is to arrange with Bishop Scadding for the transfer of the church property and funds belonging to the Eastern Oregon diocese. At 2:30 o'clock this afternoon Bishop Paddock addressed the Women's Auxiliary of Trinity parish on the subject of "Missions," and tonight will preach at St. Martin, church of the South. Bishop Paddock is the son of Bishop John A. Paddock, who was elected missionary bishop of the then territory of Washington in 1881, after a service of 26 years as rector of a church in New York City. An interesting coincidence in the life history of these men, father and son, is the fact that the son, Bishop Robert L. Paddock, was elected to the position of bishop of the diocese of Eastern Oregon after a service of 10 years as rector of a New York City church. Bishop Scadding is an ardent admirer of Bishop Scadding, believing him to be one of the greatest forces in Oregon for the moral uplift of the people. "Bishop Scadding possesses all of the requisites necessary to the making of a great prelate," said Bishop Paddock. "He is an excellent business man, a great organizer, and above all a man of unusual spiritual power. Oregon is indeed to be congratulated upon having a bishop in whom is united so many rare qualities."

Couple Now United.

Mrs. Gertrude B. Winkieback the young wife of a wealthy Seattle man, who ran away from home some ten days because she thought her husband was in love with another woman, and for whom anxious but unavailing search was made by 20 detectives for a week, was located yesterday in Portland and reunited to Mr. Winkieback.
