Portland may have a large automobile factory. If the promoters, who are E. Kelly and Kelly, bond lawyers of Topeka, Kan., receive the kind of encouragement they desire, a letter written to the chamber of commerce Mr. Kelly says that he is anxious to build an automobile factory in Portland with an annual output of from 100 to 150 cars to start with, to be increased later to from 500 to 800 cars a year. He states that his company has some very valuable patents and new inventions for use in the manufacture of automobiles and thinks that Portland people should subscribe to the stock in the company.

Suit for \$2500 damages against Brown & McCabe, a firm of attorneys, was begun in the circuit court yesterday by Frank Miller, yesterday by J. R. Douglas. The plaintiff says that he, Miller, was severely injured on August 14 while engaged in loading lumber on the Portland Lumber company wharf. It was his duty to take the lumber from the wharf and swing on deck, and he alleges that owing to the defective condition of a steam winch and the tackle a load from the wharf fell, fracturing his left leg above the knee.

A new worry was added to the record of James A. Finch, the slayer of Ralph B. Fisher, by the filing of a suit against him in the circuit court yesterday by E. Douglas. The plaintiff says that he, Finch, and E. C. Riddell, the latter an employe in Finch's office, signed a note for \$500 to Merchants National on October 27, due one month later. Each one of them received \$100 of the money, he says, but when the time came to pay Finch and Riddell would not pay their shares and he was compelled to foot the bill. He wants recovery of \$100 and \$25 attorney fees from Finch.

WORK FOR BETTER CITY

East Side Clubs Will Use United Efforts to Obtain Large Improvements.

One of the best attended and most enthusiastic meetings ever held in this city was held in the Healy building, at Grand avenue and East Morrison street, last night, when delegates from practically all parts of the city met to consider the questions of municipal lighting, street construction, garbage collection and water system. Every section of the east side from the peninsula to Mount Scott and from Mount Tabor to the river was represented and every phase of the various questions was discussed.

Committees were appointed to look into each one of these four questions and they will report at the next meeting. It is intended to go after these things with organized effort, with the understanding of the improvement clubs. Charles Coopey of the Gordon Falls company was present at the meeting and submitted samples of basalt rock which he says abounds around the site of Gordon Falls, and which was mentioned by several experts in the club as being of very fine quality. There is an abundance of the rock around Gordon Falls in easy access of both the river and the O. R. & N. railway. The club intends to further investigate the Gordon Falls proposition in the hope that it will prove a remedy for the present lack of street paving material. The committees appointed were as follows:

Installation of a municipal garbage plant and the municipal collection of garbage—Dr. M. G. McCorkle, chairman; C. E. Duggart, J. P. Wilson, M. D. McFaul and C. A. Bigelow.

Construction of streets—T. J. Murphy, chairman; J. W. Smith, W. E. Nola, W. P. Peterson and G. B. Frank. Water mains—F. J. Perkins, chairman; Charles Stout, M. C. Van Tyne, A. G. Finkler and F. J. Shames. Electric light plant—W. J. Martin, chairman; W. M. Jackson, M. J. Lee, W. F. Coffey and H. G. Parsons.
