

ESSENTIALS FOR THE MEDICAL EXAMINERS

Says State Board of Medical Examiners Neglected Duties for Years—Oregon Is Now Overrun With Incompetent Physicians.

The city of Portland and the entire state of Oregon are overrun with licensed doctors who are utterly unfit to practice medicine. At least this is the substance of statements made by a number of the reputable physicians of Portland this morning.

This startling condition of affairs it is alleged has been brought about by the carelessness of the state board of medical examiners which, it is said, up to five years ago, when Dr. A. C. Pantan became a member, licensed every Oregon man who applied, no matter whether he could pass the legal examination or not.

Dr. Pantan told what he considered to be the cause for the great number of physicians in the state who would not allow themselves to be examined by the board of examiners.

HEADS OF FOUR SPLIT WITH AN

Colorado Family Exterminated, Save One Daughter, Who Is Missing.

Denver, Dec. 5.—(United Press Leased Wire.)—The heads of four members of the family of Casmo Garcia were found dead today in their home on Corcoran street with their heads split with an ax, according to reports received here today.

The dead are: Casmo Garcia, 75 years old; his wife, 52 years old; his daughter, 25 years old; and his son, 25 years old.

The authorities are looking for Francisco Martinez, who had been a guest in the home of the Garcia family, and who is believed to be the murderer.

The bodies were found by Nicholas Fernandez, who called at the Garcia home on an errand. A bloody ax with which the deed was committed was found near the door.

Mrs. Goode asserts that Reed promised to resign his trust, but later refused to do so. She has attached to her petition a letter in which she expresses willingness to retire only when she has approved his acts.

Mrs. Goode also expressed strong dissatisfaction with Frederick V. Holman, attorney for the administrator, who was attorney for the Portland Railway, Light & Power company at the time of Goode's death.

Mrs. Goode charges that Reed failed to make an inventory of \$10,000 in common stock of the street railway that Goode was president of.

Stock of the Sunset Real Estate company is alleged to have been sold at par value, but later received in full.
