District Attorney Darrin Admits He Expects to Encounter an Insanity Defense—Both Sides Promise Surprises.

Flushing, L. I., Dec. 5.—Justice Crane will decide Monday whether the trial of the Jenkins Hains, accused with killing the publisher William E. Annis, shall begin as planned on December 14 or whether it must be indefinitely postponed. The defense alleges the special jury ordered in the case was improperly drawn in that it was not selected from the jury box in open court with a supreme court justice presiding. The law demands this and Justice Crane must decide whether this point can be overruled.

WORSER THAN DEATH FOR RUDOVITZ

ALL WHEELS IN MOTION AGAIN

This News From Over the Nation — Westinghouse Case Convinces — Huge Projects Are Taken Up — Wages Advance.

Mugs Traction Contract.
Here in New York nearly every line displays active interest in the fact that the newly organized Braxley-McIntyre Stearns contracting company, the members of which are very close to Leader Charles Murphy of Tammany, has booked a \$30,000,000 contract from the New York, New Haven & Hartford railroad.

South Also Doing Well.
Conditions are the same in the south. Word from Baltimore is to the effect that the Consolidated Cotton Duck company and other firms of a similar kind have returned to full time and all the orders they can take care of are waiting.

Best of All, Wages to Go Up.
But the best feature, from the standpoint of the business men here, is the declaration that wages are to be advanced to the point from which they were reduced when the panic of a year and a half ago struck the country.

Colorado and the far west also add to the chorus of mills and factories starting up and structural work that had been delayed is being resumed, now that there is money in sight and the corporations feel certain that business will be revived with the country.

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
