## Insurance Man Called Forger

Frank Evans' Action Partially Explained, but a Warrant Awaits Him.

A warrant has been issued for the arrest of Frank Evans, a local and prominent life insurance agent, charging him with forgery and the police are trying to locate him today. Evans, it is said, forged the name of Arthur R. Greer to a promissory note for \$32.28 and gave the note to his landlady, Mrs. R. Gee, of 13 East Seventh street, in payment for board and room. It is asserted that Evans made Mrs. Gee promise that she would not open a sealed envelope which was kept for him for 10 days after receiving it, thus giving him ample time to leave the city, but that the landlady became suspicious and opened the envelope and discovered the forgery.

At the office of the National Life Insurance company, in the upstairs building, where Evans is employed, it is explained that Arthur R. Greer had applied for a life insurance policy recently, and that he did sign the note in payment of his premium, which was not turned over to the company, but to Mrs. Greer by Evans and named as the agent of the company. The note was not good, they say, because Greer's policy had not yet been granted and sent to Portland from the company's office in the east.

It is denied that Evans is mixed up in any crooked deal, and alleged that he was seen by one of the other agents of the company in town last night, thus contradicting the assertion that he had left town to avoid the authorities.
