DORANDO MAY RACE CALIFORNIA CHAMP

Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 10.—Arrangements are being completed today for a Marathon race here between Dorando, the famous Italian runner, and Cornelius Connelly of San Francisco. E. L. Pickering, a local sporting manager, is conducting the negotiations. Dorando's manager has already agreed to bring the champion out here if the terms are satisfactory. Pickering has received the following message late last night: "After Dorando races Longboat here next Tuesday night at Madison Square Garden he will be open to race all comers and Cornelius Connelly can have a match in Los Angeles if the terms are satisfactory. The race must be at the full Marathon distance, 26 miles 385 yards."

RUNAWAY RACEHORSE INJURES TWO MEN

Los Angeles, Dec. 10.—Two men were injured when Pontex, ridden by E. Martin, ran away at Santa Anita racetrack yesterday afternoon. Pontex, a colt owned by the Santa Anita racing association, was being exercised by trainer John Damron, a colored stable boy, and most of his teeth knocked out as he galloped and reared and was badly bruised and rendered unconscious for 10 minutes, as the result of the runaway. The colt was thrown over the fence but escaped uninjured. While the track officials were repairing to start the first race, Pontex was turned and dashed madly back toward the barrier throwing his rider. The trainer, John Damron, and Vance and Damron were in the path of the maddened horse and were run down. The starter refused to allow Pontex to start in the race. He was a 100 to one shot and the money bet on him was not refunded.

INDOOR TEAMS PLAY ELEVEN MING GAME

It took 11 innings of the hardest kind of indoor baseball to declare the winner of last night's game between the Oregon Casket company and East Side Athletic club teams of the City Indoor Baseball league. The club boys started out an exciting base hits and tallies like easy money but the casket makers tied things up in the ninth by some heavy slugging, aided by several miscues of the club infield. Gumm, the fifty little second baseman of the East Siders, distinguished himself by smashing out four hits, pulling off three sensational plays and crossing the plate in the ninth inning with the winning run for the club team. McKenzie, the star twirler of the athletic club, was not in his usual good form and was hit freely at critical times. Birkmyer, who essayed to bend "over" for the casket makers, was replaced by Sweeney in the sixth, the latter doing very well for two innings. Each team secured 15 safe hits. McKenzie struck out 15 men, Birkmyer 8 and Sweeney 10. The final score was 14-4. A larger crowd attended than on the opening night and was kept to the high noon of the game, watching the fast and sensational plays, thrilling base sliding and comical miscues. Hare is a sophomore at the peninsular school and is 18 years of age. This season was his second on the first team and he has a record for consistent play. His selection as captain of the all-intercollegiate center was a deserved one. Hare came to Portland from Seattle but his home lately has been in Seattle. Dean Walker, captain of the eleven this season, will graduate in June.

The latter defeated him in quick time, but Gotch lost a handicap match by falling to throw him five times in an hour in New York. Rogers losing only two falls in the time allowed.

TRICHINOSIS IN VALLEJO CASE

Experts Divide on Cause of Poisoning—All Authorities Investigate.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Dec. 10.—While the state board of health will continue its investigations of the cause of the poisoning of several hundred citizens throughout the state who attend the launching of the collier Prometheus at Vallejo, Saturday, the entertainment committee of that town will begin an inquiry to fix the blame for the furnishing of impure food that is believed to have caused the widespread sickness. Twenty-four additional cases of ptomaine poisoning were reported yesterday afternoon and last night at Vallejo. Two of these victims, Mrs. William Cantrell and Robert Cleghorn Jr., are said to be dangerously ill. Druggists at Vallejo are filling prescriptions on an average of 200 a day. The state board officials are continuing the examination of the food and are divided in theory between ptomaine and trichinosis. Experiments on live guinea pigs will be made to test the effects of samples from different foods that were served at the luncheon will be noted.

Vallejo, Cal., Dec. 10.—Leon Cohn, the San Francisco caterer, whose low bid on the luncheon at which hundreds of prominent citizens were poisoned at the time of the launching of the collier Prometheus, told the entertainment committee that he expected to make the matter financially out of the contract, but that he expected to benefit by the advertisement derived. Cohn was the lowest of four bidders. He quoted 50 cents a plate; Tichener & Butler of Vallejo quoted 55 cents, if union waiters were employed, and 60 cents if non-union help was engaged; John Tait of San Francisco quoted 55 cents a plate; the Wheeler & Hayward catering company of San Francisco quoted 85 cents a plate. Of the contract price of \$1675 only \$700 has been paid and it is probable that the rest will be withheld, at least until an investigation by the state board of health is concluded. When the contract was about to be awarded, the committee investigated Cohn and found he was considered reliable. The promise of a bonus of \$1000 if everything was satisfactory. The contract called for the providing of fresh supplies.

ACCUSE LINE OF OVERHAND TRUCK

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Dec. 10.—Prominent packers, canners and tanners are accusing the American-Hawaiian Steamship company of a deliberate purpose to throttle competition by chartering a steamer solely to oppose the sailing vessels of the independent shippers and by lowering the rates on salmon shipments from the northern cities to New York in order that San Francisco might be discriminated against and punished for daring to seek a cheaper medium for transporting Pacific coast products to the Atlantic seaboard. The trouble, it is alleged, commenced a year ago, when a few shippers in this city sought to and an economical way to send their freight to New York. Desiring to patronize American-owned vessels, and not being able to pay the inflated rates of the independent shippers, they chartered a steamer to put the William P. Frye, a sailing ship, into commission. Unknown agents, since learned to be connected with the American-Hawaiian line, mysteriously chartered the ship for Aberdeen.

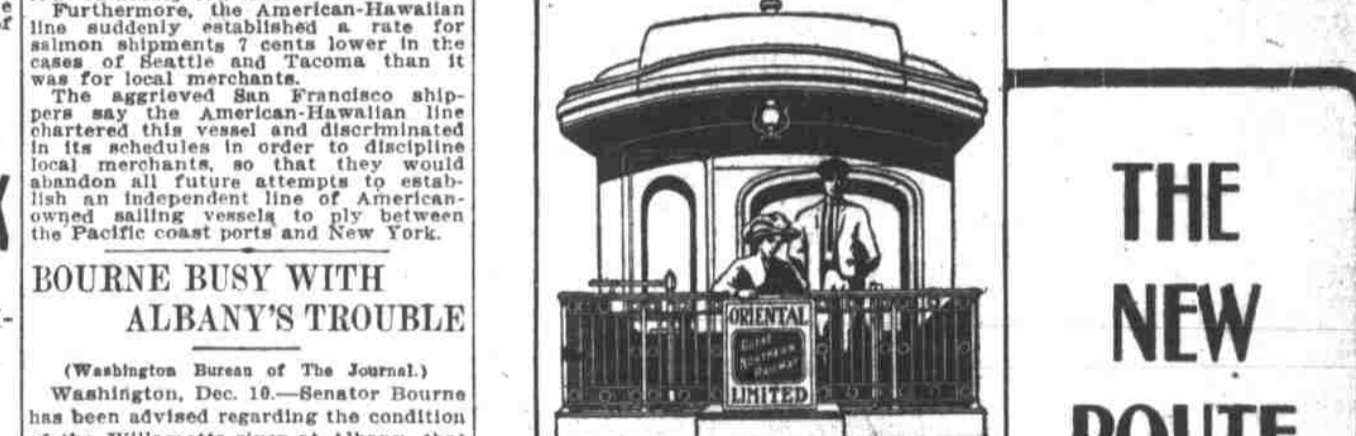
