JOHNSON MURDER TRIAL SPEEDS UP HOUSE ACTS ON THINGS LEFT FOR DEAD

Committee of Five Named to Report on the Proper Course to Pursue. Damaging Testimony Taken Against Alleged Slayer of Elmer Perdue.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Hillsboro, Or., Dec. 11.—In the Walter Johnson murder trial this morning, Charles Hines of Forest Grove described the blood stains on the clothing of Elmer Perdue, whom Johnson is alleged to have murdered. He gave as his opinion that the skull had been broken by a blow and not by gunshot. He said that it is probable that the iron hook found in the cabin...

Testimony Taken Thursday. Bryce Wilson of Timber was the first witness sworn and he testified that he filed that on July 2, 1908, Johnson and Perdue were at his house and purchased provisions. Johnson introduced himself as a member of the defendant club and his companion "Elmer." This was the last that he saw of either until after the Johnson murder...

Perkins' Criticism. Perkins then arose to a question of personal privilege and said that he did not believe in over-sensitiveness to unfavorable criticism, whether upon an individual or upon a public body. But, he pointed out, while there may be undue sensitiveness, so also there may be indifference which argues a lack of proper self-respect.

The Dalles Firm Is Charged With Passing Worthless Checks. (Special Dispatch to The Journal.) The Dalles, Or., Dec. 11.—A complaint charging T. H. FRANCE PUTS LED ON CASTRO. (United Press Leased Wire.) Paris, Dec. 11.—The council of ministers today dispatched an emissary to President Castro of Venezuela enjoining him from engaging in other than private conversation during his sojourn in France. Proposals were made in the meeting that a demand be made on Castro that he send a cable to Caracas ordering the payment of interest due French creditors and that he allow the Brazilian legation to represent France.

WATERWAYS MEN FROM PROGRAM. (United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, Dec. 11.—A resolution demanding that congress provide for the issuance of \$500,000,000 of bonds to be sold with the money to be used in carrying out a comprehensive plan for the improvement of the waterways of the United States was adopted today by the National Rivers and Harbors congress. The resolution provides that President Roosevelt should be authorized to appoint a committee of five to draft a bill providing for the bond issue and the creation of a national waterways commission to study the problem of waterway improvement at home and abroad and report to congress annually.

THIRTEEN JURORS IN THE KOREAN'S CASE. San Francisco, Dec. 11.—Thirteen jurors have been sworn today to try in Whatan Chung, the Korean, charged with the murder of Durham White Stevens, the American diplomat, in this city last March. The 13th man sworn as a precaution against delay in the case, should a juror become incapacitated. The opening argument and the taking of evidence will begin Monday morning. In the meantime the police are searching for Ming Woon Chun, companion of Chung, who was shot in Chicago at the time of the attack on Stevens. Chun disappeared from a hospital and has not been heard of since.

DEAD AT MACHINE. (United Press Leased Wire.) Ogden, Utah, Dec. 11.—Setting type at 3 o'clock this morning, P. M. Jones, a linotype operator, formerly of Omaha and San Francisco, dropped dead of heart failure at his machine. He was found this morning when the printing office was opened. RANCHER WHITEHEAD CAUGHT NEAR HOME. (United Press Leased Wire.) San Bernardino, Cal., Dec. 11.—After being pursued by possees for more than 24 hours, J. E. Whitehead, the Chino rancher, was today seriously wounded by his neighbor Charles B. Smith, who shot him in the back. The officers captured Whitehead while he was hiding in a grove near his home late last night. He was rendered without resistance. Believing the fugitive rancher would attempt to make his way home, the posse followed him as he fled. Late last night the posse observed a member of Whitehead's family steal into a grove near the house. They followed and captured the man. He was taken to the hospital at Pomona, where Whitehead is being cared for, and his condition is better today and has a good chance of recovery. No charge will be preferred against Whitehead until the fate of his victim is learned. Workingmen Injured. (United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Dec. 11.—Four workmen were injured today in the collapse of the shoring on a new reinforced concrete building on California street below Beane street, when it broke down with a crash, killing the unemployed laborer with cement and broken timbers. Neil Nelson, Harry Litgo and Angelo Gross of this city and Valentine E. Bernell of Oakland were most seriously hurt, and they were taken to the Harbor emergency hospital for treatment. There were no fatal injuries. FINED FIFTY DOLLARS. Gold Beach Man Charged With Selling Liquor Illegally. (Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
