## LONGBOAT WINS FROM DORANDO

### Italian Marathon Runner Collapses During Race With the Indian.

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
New York, Dec. 15.—Dorando Pietri, of Capri, Italy, hero of the collapse, was beaten in the Marathon race at Madison Square Garden last night by Tom Longboat, the wonderful Canadian Indian runner. Dorando led most of the way and when within sight of the finish line succumbed to exhaustion. Longboat finishing alone in 2:45:00, the mark being 35 to 60 seconds slower than that established by Dorando in his race against Johnny Hayes recently. The distance was 26 miles, 38 yards. Longboat's tactics worried Dorando considerably and were probably responsible for the Italian's defeat. Dorando took the lead at the start and maintained it nearly all the distance, except when Longboat spurred into the lead for brief intervals. The first five miles developed a grueling race between the pair. Dorando kept in the commanding position all the distance, but the Indian pushed him hard. The five miles was turned a minute faster than the Dorando-Hayes race. Longboat ceased worrying the Italian for several miles, when he took up the spurring tactics again. Going into the fourth mile, the red man took the lead away from the olive-skinned athlete. Longboat's time was 18 to 25 ahead by the previous time of Dorando and Hayes for 14 miles. This time Longboat allowed Dorando to take the lead in the sixteenth mile. In the following mile both men weakened visibly. Longboat appearing the worse off. However, the Indian rallied wonderfully and his long, swinging lunge-stride carried him ahead in the twentieth mile. Three miles farther the Indian regained the lead he lost in the twenty-first mile. Dorando took the lead in the twenty-fourth mile and held it until the beginning of the twenty-sixth mile. Here the wonderful endurance of the Indian showed itself. He took the lead away from the jagged foreigner. In the next half mile Longboat established a quarter of a mile lead and a great effort to recover the lost ground but collapsed when a little over half way through the mile. Dorando, it is remembered, collapsed in the running of the Olympic Marathon race in London, England, last July, being beaten by the runner of an American, Hayes. Longboat and Dorando are now professionals.

## MIKE DWYER HERE FOR O'CONNELL BOUT

### FAMOUS GRAPPLER READY FOR THURSDAY

Looking more like the president of an eastern railroad or a prosperous Wall Street financier than a professional wrestler, Professor Michael J. Dwyer arrived in Portland this morning to wrestle with the champion grappler, Ed O'Connell, in the Exposition rink tomorrow night. Mr. Dwyer is the picture of health, although he says he is pretty tired from his long journey from Chicago.

Dwyer was met at the train by a number of his eastern friends, headed by Warren Sweetland. He has established his headquarters at the new imperial hotel where he will be pleased to greet all his old time friends. Several of them called on him this morning.

"This is my first visit out to the north coast," said Mr. Dwyer this morning. "It was a hard ride from Chicago and I had a pretty good time in order to keep down to weight. A fellow of my build will take on seven or eight pounds before he knows it. But it feels good to get into a new country after riding across those desolate plains. I like Oregon already, and its people are simply lovely."

**In Splendid Condition.**  
"I am in splendid condition for Thursday night's affair. I would like to have been able to get here a week or two before the bout, but I could not get away from my work at the Illinois Athletic club. In addition to being wrestling instructor there, I am also physical director, which, in so large a club, takes up all a person's time.

"I saw the greatest wrestling match ever staged here in Chicago the other night between Mahmut, the big Turk, and Fred Beal. I've seen them all but none could approach them. Let me tell you that Frank Gotch will not be the ghost of a show with the Turk. He knows the game from A to Z and in a beautifully built fellow with just the right proportions for a wrestler. It was only sheer cleverness that kept Beal in the twenty-fourth mile and held him until the beginning of the twenty-sixth mile. Here the wonderful endurance of the Indian showed itself. He took the lead away from the jagged foreigner.

"I have not seen O'Connell for several years. He is a pretty good wrestler when I went against him some five years ago, and I understand that he has become quite an expert since. With all his speed and cleverness I am confident that I can take his measure again, even in a handicap match of three falls in an hour.

## PAPKE-KELLY GO DECLARED DRAW

### Referee Jim Jeffries Renders an Excellent Decision in Middleweight Battle.

Los Angeles, Dec. 15.—Jim Jeffries gave one of the best decisions rendered hereabouts in a long time when he called a draw between Billy Papke and Hugo Kelly at Vernon arena last night. Naturally there are those who claim a victory for both ways but Jeffries is generally supported in the justness of his verdict.

Billy Papke is resting in a Turkish bath house today with a terribly beaten face and a soreness of heart. In a storm of disappointment he declared after the fight that he intended to quit the ring for good. This is not taken very seriously and after the bruises have worn away Billy will probably be himself again.

The fact that Papke shows marks of the battle does not mean that Kelly out-fought him. It was the fact that Papke showed himself the aggressor at all times in addition to having Kelly in bad trouble that earned him a draw.

Superb ring generalship or luck saved Kelly from a knockout in the fourth round. Papke caught him a clip with his left to the jaw. Kelly fell flat and Jeff counted nine over him before he found his feet.

**Kelly's Wonderful Judgment.**  
Kelly displayed wonderful boxing ability and he certainly needed it. Papke refused to stop while his strength lasted and then he was always the aggressor.

Sam Berger coached Papke from his corner and the big fellow's directions more than once got Billy out of trouble. For 10 rounds the bout was a hot one after which the pace seemed to tell on both men.

After the fight Jim Jeffries said: "Had I been forced to give a decision in the twenty-third round Kelly would have won. Papke came back so strong in the last round that I could not let Kelly have it."

Kelly did most of the hanging on while Papke forced the fighting. I could see nothing else but a draw."

Billy Papke slept in a Turkish bath house last night with chunks of ice on his swollen features.

Hugo Kelly was about town this morning unconcerned and rather non-committal regarding the decision.
