

ANNIS ON WITNESS STAND

Testifies to Scenes From Shooting to Death of Husband - Clubman Tells How T. Jenkins Hains Stood Guard.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Flushing, N. Y., Dec. 17.—(Trib.)—The beauty accentuated by the dress black of her mourning costume, Mrs. William E. Annis took the witness stand today in the trial of T. Jenkins Hains for the murder of her husband.
When Mrs. Annis' name was called she emerged from the district attorney's office and walked steadily and calmly to the witness chair. She wore a black necktie over a handsome black dress and a black hat that was heavily draped with crepe.
Mrs. Annis' testimony was mainly confined to the circumstances of her husband's death. She said that Dr. Smock was present when Annis expired.
Judge Crane explained to her that many of the questions which perhaps seemed foolish to her were necessary, and she answered them all freely, describing minutely the last moments of the slain man.
As she was about to leave the stand Judge Crane administered another rebuke to District Attorney Darrin, saying to him:
"I don't know how you feel about it, but the jury and I would like to know when Annis died. Why not recall Mrs. Annis and find out?"
Mrs. Annis returned to the stand and said her husband died about 7:20 o'clock on the evening of the shooting. Her sister, Miss Von Heubel, sat near and supported her as she returned to Darrin's office.
The Physicians Testify.
An elaborate model, showing the Bay-side club, the float and the yachts and boats which were clustered around it when Annis was shot, will not be allowed in the trial. Before the first witness was sworn in the case today the court ruled out the exhibit which the defense had introduced, declaring that it was misleading to the jury, as it was badly out of proportion.
Dr. Johnson McLeod of Flushing testified as to the nature of the wound which Annis received, and Dr. Smock of the Flushing hospital related the details of the operation performed on Annis.
Drs. Bloodgood and Frye testified on the same matter.
Morton Scura, a Bay-side club driver, who drove the Hains brothers to the yacht club, said that before entering the club the two men, Thornton and the captain, had a whispered conversation.
How T. Jenkins Hains Stood Guard.
Charles Burchfield, a member of the Bay-side yacht club, testified that Thornton Hains and the captain had a conversation with a waiter at the restaurant at 2 o'clock in the afternoon. He said the captain called his brother from a group in the clubhouse and later he saw the two walking toward the dock. When the boat was nearing the float at the time.
The witness then related the incidents immediately preceding the shooting. After the shooting had ended, Burchfield made a step toward the Hains brothers and said to Thornton: "For God's sake, stop this crazy thing. Thornton was standing with his feet well braced, his right hand extended, pointing a pistol at him.
Burchfield quoted the defendant as shouting to him: "Keep back, keep back. He knows what he's doing."
Burchfield said he kept advancing towards Thornton, who cried: "Don't interfere, or you'll get the same dose."
Burchfield said he stopped at this warning and the defendant then pointed his revolver at a bystander named Roberts. Burchfield said:
"I heard three shots distinctly. Then there were others. I don't know how many. After the shooting began Mrs. Annis flew screaming down the runway. Then she ran back up the runway."
He testified that he saw Thornton pass by his room, and that he saw John Tanning catch the captain by the wrist after the shooting. Then he said he saw Thornton make Tanning release the captain.
Judge Reassures State's Attorney.
Judge Crane administered a stinging rebuke to District Attorney Darrin late yesterday afternoon. He leaped forward from the bench, and looking at Darrin said:
"Are you asleep there? Do you want me to try this case for you? Why aren't you interposing statutory objections to this sort of improper testimony?"
Darrin seemed nonplussed and mumbled an excuse.
The attorney-in-chief was then asking Edward Andrews Jr. an eye witness of the killing of William E. Annis, whether he heard Captain Hains say:
"Annis stole my wife while I was in the Philippines and took her up to Fort-third street for an operation. Why shouldn't I kill him?"
The witness replied that he did not hear the captain say that before the judge interrupted.

STUDENTS HIDE CORNERSTONE

Salem, Or., Dec. 17.—Students of Willamette university last night hid the cornerstone which is to play the leading part at the ceremonies of the cornerstone laying of the new Eaton hall this afternoon. After a long and diligent search on the part of the college authorities the cornerstone was located about noon today buried in a ground under the corner of an old woodshed on the campus. For a time it appeared doubtful whether the ceremony could take place.
Not satisfied with this prank, the students secreted all the lids of the heaters in the recreation rooms, so no negotiations could be held this morning. As school was dismissed for the ceremony this afternoon, the lack of heat will not be seriously felt. When the chapel exercises opened this morning a cow was found in the room.
Those who will take part this afternoon are: Judge George H. Burnett, E. A. Eaton, Dr. B. L. Ador, J. A. Mills, and the Rev. J. B. Spencer, M. B. Rankin and Bishop Charles W. Smith. The ceremonies are under the auspices of the "Chambers" lodge of the Independent Order of Oddfellows.

Arthur C. Spencer will appear with J. J. Fitzgerald for the state and will aid in the conduct of the prosecution. In conducting the case Mr. Spencer does not as a friend of the murdered prosecutor of the bar association, having offered his services without compensation.

DANGLING AT ROPE'S END, MAN WHEN CUT DOWN SPEEDS AWAY

Eugene, Or., Dec. 17.—Sheriff Brown was called to a point near Junction City yesterday afternoon to look after a man who had attempted suicide by hanging himself by a rope from the stringers of a county wagon bridge. The man was found by a telephone construction crew who thought he was dead. They cut him down. After lying on the ground a few minutes he surprised the telephone men by regaining consciousness and running away, disappearing from sight in a wooded tract near here. The people residing in that vicinity are much wrought up over the affair as they think the man is insane and may attempt to do bodily harm to them. He was unknown to the men who cut him down. He was described as being about 20 years of age, and wore a khaki suit and light hat.

DIVERTS TRADE FROM SOUND

Hill Lines Will Handle Portland Shipments Over North Bank Road.

According to an official notice issued by the Northern Pacific and the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railways, beginning today, all freight service between Portland and points on the Northern Pacific east of Pasco and on the Great Northern east of Spokane will go by way of North Bank road instead of over the Northern Pacific to Tacoma.
The notices read as follows:
"The opening of the line of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railway, the North Bank road, for business to and from Portland and points on the Northern Pacific east of Pasco, is a shorter and quicker route was offered to the public than therefore available for the movement of freight traffic between Portland and points on the Northern Pacific railway east of Pasco, including Walla Walla, Pendleton, Waukegan, Dayton, Lewiston, Moscow, Bismarck, Garfield, Oakesdale, Spokane, Wallace, Burke, Mullan, also all points on the Great Northern railway east of Spokane, including points on lines connecting with the Great Northern and Northern Pacific."
"In order that the best possible service may be rendered, the Northern Pacific railway will discontinue entirely the movement of freight traffic to and from points east of Pasco on the one hand, and to or from Vancouver, Portland, Everett, and other points west of the Columbia river on the other hand, and shippers are requested to deliver such east bound traffic to the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railway and to route west bound traffic via Pasco and the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railway. An exception is also made of traffic moving to and from points on the Southern Pacific south of Portland, through rates less than the combination of the local rates to and from Portland are in effect via other lines for the reason that arrangements have not yet been made to apply these through rates via the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railway."
"Shippers at Portland are requested to deliver less carload traffic at the depot of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railway, Eleventh and Hoyt streets, Portland."
"W. C. Wilkes has been appointed agent and will handle all freight information or advice which may be required by shippers."

San Francisco, Dec. 17.—On account of the killing of Lee Hong, a member of the On Yick tong, who was shot to death yesterday by members of the rival Sit Lok tong, all the leaders of the warring highlander societies are being taken into custody by the police and will be held as hostages until hostilities cease. Chief of Police Wilson announces his intention to keep the officers of the tongs in prison until the peace treaty is signed between the societies and the bloody feud is ended.
Lee Hong was shot on Harrison street between Second and Third yesterday, two bullets penetrating his back. He was hurried to the receiving hospital, which is near by, but he died in a few minutes.
The police then searched the headquarters of the rival tong and after much work broke down doors and found in an inner room a small arsenal guarded by several innocent looking Chinese, all of whom were arrested.
The reopening of hostilities among the highlanders so soon after the Chinese consul's threat that the misdeeds of the tongs would be visited on the families of the offenders in their native land shows the police that the present feud is very deep.

RIVAL TONGS' LEADERS JAILED

Twelve men to hear the evidence in the case of Harry Daly, charged with murder in the first degree, were secured by Judge Gantenbein in the circuit court this morning, and this afternoon the attorneys made their opening statements to the jury. Daly shot and killed Harry Kenny, a saloon man, on the night of November 15, just after he had applied for work and had been told that there was none for him.
Daly's defense will be insanity. There was no provocation for the killing but it will be claimed that Daly at different times has shown himself irresponsible mentally when angry. John H. Stevens and Walter W. Humphreys, who are conducting the defense, will try to convince the jury that Daly was in a mental condition of insanity when he shot Kenny.
J. V. Burk, the first man accepted on the jury, caused a ripple of interest when, after being passed by the attorneys for the defense, he replied to a question from the other side that he knew a reason why he could not serve as a jurymen.
"I was on a jury here not long ago," he said, "and they cooped us up in a little box upstairs that is a regular fire trap. I don't think that a man ought to be put up there when he is on a jury."
This unexpected reply did not avail the juror, who was accepted by both sides in the trial. Only four peremptory challenges were used by the defense, while two were exercised by the state and two by the prosecution. Attorneys Page and Moessnig are in charge of the case for the state, and will argue the verdict that will send Daly to the gallows.
On the jury are J. V. Burk, W. H. Colwell, J. J. Coffey, Carl A. Carlson, Clarence Fanner, Alonzo Perkins, Dave Allen, E. A. Bamford, H. G. Chickering and E. M. Lance.

BILL DEFINES OREGON CUSTOMS DISTRICTS

Washington, Dec. 17.—The bill defining the customs collection districts of Oregon, which was recalled from the house, having passed both bodies, passed the senate today. In its present form it corrects the definition of the Astoria district.
Eight slot machines that have been ringing merrily in four saloons at Linton found judgment in the county jail late yesterday afternoon as the result of a raid made by Deputy Sheriffs Huckaby and Boyer. The sheriff under the law is charged with the duty of destroying the confiscated machines.
Recently complaint was made to the sheriff that slot machines were running in Linton, and the deputies were sent out with a wagon yesterday afternoon to take charge of the forbidden money getters. Two machines were found in the saloon of Cochran Bros., two more at C. Carlson's, one at Henry West's and three in Power's place. In the remaining saloon nothing was found. In each place, before a seizure was made the deputies, who were unknown to the saloon men, played their slots on the machine and collected pay when they won. Three of the machines were of the large upright variety, and the others were exclusively while the others sat on the counters and paid in checks, which were received at face value, in cash or trade.
The machines are said to be the property of Henry Griffin, who leased them to the proprietors of the saloons, sharing the profits with them. The saloon men were told to appear later, and complaints will be filed against them on the charge of violating the anti-gambling laws.

STOLEN MONEY ORDERS MAY CAUSE MERCHANTS SOME LOSSES

Merchants, saloonmen, cigar dealers and various other markets of Portland are being notified by Postmaster Minto today to be on the lookout for the appearance of money orders from Bellingham, Wash., station No. 5. The forms are numbered from 1401 to 1600, and were stolen from the office last night.
These precautions are being taken to prevent the public from being victimized. The thieves usually fill out the orders to suit themselves and present them among the stores or saloons on Saturdays or at other times that the postoffice is closed. The game in most instances is worked by the person who the fraud order making a small purchase and getting change for the paper he gives in payment for the goods.
By refusing to cash any money orders except where the applicant is properly identified Mr. Minto says the postoffice authorities will be assisted materially and at the same time the public will protect themselves against losing money by this means. When a money order is cashed the person taking it is loser in the event that the paper develops to have been stolen.

JUROR'S PLEA GETS SCANT HEARING

Objects to Being "Cooped Up in a Fire Trap," But Court Refuses to Excuse J. V. Burk From Service.

San Francisco, Dec. 17.—Fearing the spread of the fight between the Chinese tongs in this city and Oakland to the oriental quarters of Portland, Los Angeles, Sacramento and San Jose, the local Chinese consul general, Hsu Ping-Chen, will meet with the representatives of the Chinese Six companies here today to discuss the possibility of a home government that its subjects refrain from combat. Word has come to the consul general that the On Yick tong and the Sit Lok tong are planning to execute a simultaneous attack on its enemies on the eve of the approaching Chinese New Year in the cities of the coast. By doing this they would avoid retaliation on the part of the opposing tongs and they would avoid the New Year season, when every enemy must be buried.
Two deaths have already been posted to the credit of the Sit Lok tong and the men who have committed the murders have fled to avoid the vengeance of the On Yick tong. The On Yick tong is believed that Chu Chin Ching, who was found strangled today at Chicago, was one of the Sit Lok murderers and that the On Yick tong have evened one score. The other highlanders who joined in last night's murder have scattered in many directions and the On Yicks have instructed their members in the coast cities to be on the lookout for their enemies. The On Yicks, the Sit Lok and the On Yicks in Los Angeles have become involved in a quarrel over a stolen slave girl, and the bitter feud may end in bloodshed. For the first time in the history of slave girl thefts, the Chinese appealed to the authorities for aid in recovering their property and a local Chinese it will be deemed a deadly insult by the offended tong and either a heavy indemnity or warfare will follow.

VALGRANT HORDE FROM SEATTLE

Avalanche of Undesirables Will Soon Reach Portland From Puget Sound.

The Portland police are preparing for even greater vigilance in driving out undesirable. It is expected that the addition of 35 men to the Seattle police department made this week, will result in yegmen and vagrants of all kinds being forced out of the Puget sound city and sent southward to Portland.
Cute connoisseurs the hoboes who drop off the trains at the small towns, for along the Northern Pacific as well as the Southern Pacific line through the Willamette valley the town constables now stand at the depot and compel every tramp who has quietly dropped off to board the train and continue his journey.
Seattle has had the same increase in crime this winter as Portland, but that city now has a staff of over 30 men in plain clothes whose chief duty it is to round up suspected vagrants and see that they leave the city. Portland has 12 men in plain clothes, with practically the same work to be done.
The police officers are asking Judge Van Zante to make it a rule in his court to sentence every floating vagrant found to possess a gun to 90 days imprisonment. This, they declare, will make yegmen afraid to enter the city and will also discourage all classes of undesirables.
Andrew Backman, taken out of Blagier's saloon on Burnside street by Officers Shaffer and Leavens last night and found to have a revolver and a pair of brass knuckles, was today fined \$20 by Judge Van Zante. He had \$33, so was able to pay his fine.
George Gallego, arrested by Officer Swennes in the O. W. P. yards on the east side last night as a vagrant, was today found to have stolen copper wire and was sentenced to 30 days in jail.
