

FIFTH GRANGE ADDS VOICE

Albany Organization Calls on Statement No. 1 to Stand by Pledge.

In finding resolutions that leave no doubt as to their meaning, another Oregon Grange has condemned the attempt by politicians to defeat the popular will with respect to the election of United States senator. It is the fifth Grange to enter a protest, which with others that have preceded it, is having a powerful effect on the senatorial situation.

It is recognized that the Granges are reflective of sentiment among the masses throughout the state, and being non-political in character their resolutions carry great weight. They are accepted as meaning by any combination the verdict of the June election should be set aside there would be a reckoning in which the worth of the masses would be visited upon those responsible for the defeat of the popular will.

In Portland, it is readily conceded that the insurrecto movement is almost in the expiring stages, due to several causes. First among these is the immoral, dishonorable and revolutionary character of the movement, involving as it does the defiance of the popular will and the practical perjury of legislators-elect. Another influence that disheartened the leaders was the pronounced stand taken by President Roosevelt against the movement.

Resolved, That we condemn the action of these politicians and ask the legislature to do the only thing that is honorable and elect George E. Chamberlain for United States senator.

PICKPOCKET IN WOODSTOCK CAR

INSTRUCTS IN USE OF HOLLY STAMPS

Persons sending out Christmas packages should not use the Red Cross stamps to seal the strings or the ends of the wrapping paper when it is desired that the present should go at second or third class rates. When the Red Cross stamps are used in this way it makes the bundle practically a sealed package subject to the rates of the first class mail, 3 cents an ounce.

The postal authorities have no objection to the use of the stamps on the outside of the packages as long as they do not interfere with the regulations of the department. Second and third class matter must not be sealed. Merchandise is supposed to be sent under these rates only and the packages may be tied with strings or held together with rubber bands to allow the postal authorities to make an investigation of the contents should occasion arise.

The women selling the stamps in the postoffices were asked by the officials today to request purchasers of the little stickers not to seal packages unless they intended them to go first class. Persons violating the rules are very likely to have their packages held up and delayed in transit so that they will hardly arrive at the intended destination by Christmas.

MORE MONEY FOR OREGON EXHIBIT
