

# FOUR STATES SEAL UP BY UNCLE SAM WHILE INTERNAL CLEANSING GOES ON—ACTION AND EFFECTS OF MALADY—PREVIOUS SCOURGES.

Washington, Dec. 19.—Once more the government is engaged in a strenuous effort to stamp out foot and mouth disease which is working havoc among the cattle, sheep and swine of at least four great states. The milk and meat supply of the nation is threatened and unless the epidemic is stopped, it would be impossible to estimate the amount of damage done to the domestic industry of animals and to the interruption of interstate, intrastate, and foreign commerce. Every effort is being made to keep the disease confined within the states of New York, Pennsylvania, Maryland and Michigan, which are under the strictest quarantine. The epidemic once gets into the western cattle country it will be practically impossible to stamp it out, according to the agricultural department of the great American trade in livestock and beef will be destroyed.

## HONOR PORTLAND LAWYER IN SOUTH

McCauna Stewart of Portland, who was appointed by Governor Chamberlain delegate to the national wages meeting of the negro fair association at Mobile, Ala., reached home yesterday after having visited the national wages meeting at the college at Montgomery, Ala., and the educational institutions of the south. Mr. Stewart was one of the principal speakers at the meeting. Others on the program were Booker T. Washington, M. C. B. Mason and J. R. Marshall. Thirty-one acres of land have been secured for the exposition, the greatest of its kind attempted by the colored race, to be opened next year. There were 25 delegates at the meeting. Mr. Stewart visited the Tuskegee institute and the only college at Montgomery, Ala., and the educational institutions of the higher education of the colored people in this country.

## Board of Education Grants Average Increase of 15 Per Cent—School Tax Levy of 4.7 Mills Is Recommended to Taxpayers.

What the School Board did. Recommended a tax levy of 4.7 mills to defray expenses of \$1,000,000 for the year 1909. Adopted a resolution asking the taxpayers of the district to grant an average increase of 15 per cent in the salaries of teachers. Approved the report of the building committee relative to the proposed Albina high school and directed Chairman Campbell to advertise for bids within the next 30 days for the erection of an edifice of mill construction to cost in the neighborhood of \$250,000.

## Object to Increase of Freight Rates on Goods From the East.

The Portland Implement & Vehicle club, a recently organized association, has filed with the traffic managers of the various transcontinental railways with which its members have dealings, a vigorous protest against the proposed increase of 10 cents per 100 pounds in the freight rates on farm implements and wagons. This advance, as announced by the railroads, is scheduled to take effect on January 1. In a letter of protest the club makes the statement that they will take every fair means of endeavoring to have the decision rescinded as they believe it unnecessary if not unjust.
