### MEN WHO CARRY REVOLVERS WILL BE GIVEN THE LIMIT

"I will fine every man found carrying a pistol \$50 or more," said Municipal Judge Van Zante yesterday. "That is, unless he can prove that he was carrying it for his own protection. Heretofore I have generally fined such men \$10 each and kept the gun, but that is not severe enough. Mr. Seabrook opened my eyes to that when he was on the bench in my absence. "When a floater who has no real business in Portland is arrested with a gun in his possession I will certainly fine him heavily. In fact, I believe a few days in jail as well as a fine would be a

good thing. There is no use talking, a man with a gun is a dangerous man. In all cases the burden of proof will be on him to show that he intends it only for his own protection. The other day a young man from Minnesota with a gun and a pair of brass knuckles was arrested, but I've been through the stage myself when I thought it smart to carry a gun. He was so evidently a farmer boy that I fined him only \$20, but the man who knows by his looks that he has no business carrying a gun will be given a much heavier sentence."

### Notes From the Labor World

French labor unions have a total membership of 1,500,000.

The publication of The Electrical Worker, the organ of the Brotherhood of Electrical workers, has been resumed.

According to the last census there are in this country more than 220,000 laundresses employed in laundries.

There are 57 active labor unions in Santa Clara county, California, of which 41 are in the city of San Jose.

The Chinese government has established a school for fishermen in modern methods of fish culture.

A vigorous campaign of organization has as its objective a tri-state central labor union, taking in the District of Columbia, Maryland, and Virginia.

The recent municipal census of the unemployed in Berlin, which gave the number of workless men as 44,000, has been found wrong, the real total being at least 80,000.

The national convention of postoffice clerks at Birmingham, Ala., adopted resolutions in favor of extending classification.

The Spanish labor laws fix the maximum working hours for children between the ages of 10 and 14 years at six hours in industrial establishments, and at eight in shops and offices, with no work at night.

President T. J. Lewis, of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America, has been appointed by President Roosevelt an ex-officio member of the national advisory board, having general supervision over mine explosion investigations, and has accepted the appointment.

Peace in the ranks of organized teamsters is said to be assured by the amalgamation, after a split of more than two years' duration, of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters and the United Teamsters of America, recently brought about at a conference.

The Central Federated Union of Manhattan, New York, has decided to cooperate with the Charity Organization society of that city in its various and determined efforts to arrest the progress of tuberculosis among the various crafts, by careful investigation.

Fifteen different municipalities of Alsace-Lorraine, ranging in population from 5,000 to 175,000, conduct employment bureaus which aim to keep in close touch with the various organizations of employers and employed, with a view of applying to needs of both.

Work toward the eventual formation of a metal trades department of the Central Labor union of Boston, Mass., has been started by several locals of the international unions which are affiliated with that newest of all departments of the American Federation of Labor.

One million dollars will be disbursed by the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers in the construction of permanent headquarters in Cleveland, Ohio. The plans have already been announced by Warren S. Stone, grand chief of the organization. The sum includes the price of the required land and a building 12 stories in height.

#### "THE KING OF DIAMONDS HAS LICENSE TAKEN AWAY. Alleged Bogus Gem Man Ralls at Newspapers."

BURLINGTON, IA., Nov. 14.—For some time past newspapers in Iowa cities have been reporting the operations of a man whom they called "The King of Diamonds." It appears that there was nothing criminal in his operations, which consisted in selling "phony" diamonds, but his methods of procedure were not exactly according to the rules. He usually drops into a jobbing house and tells of meeting such and such a representative of the house on the road and selling him a diamond, to be delivered at the store. He explains that the diamond is only an imitation, and offers to sell anybody else around the place the same thing. Thus he works up an interest and usually succeeds in selling some of his glassware. Mr. Jack of Diamonds dropped into City Auditor Norton's office one morning and secured a license to sell his wares. He had only been out a short time, however, until Chief of Police Hiltz learned of him. Calling in the peddler, he relieved him of his license and gave him back the money he had paid for it. As the man had committed no crime he was released. He was bitter against the newspapers for injuring his business.
