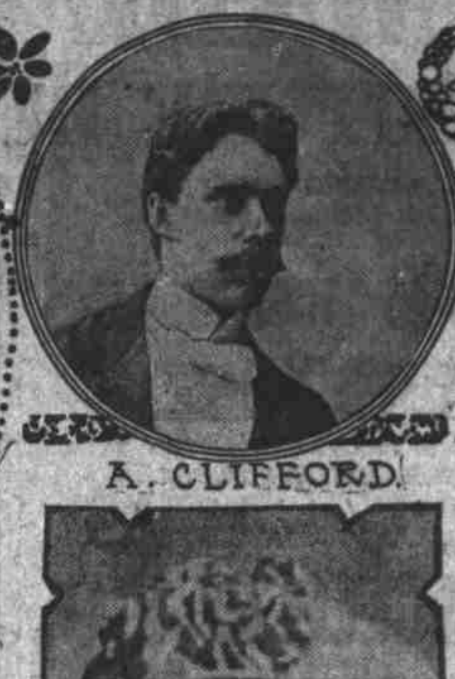

Worker Worthy of His Wage

Bourne Keeps Hammering Away Hopefully on That Salary Raise.

Washington, Dec. 19.—Senator Bourne of Oregon, author of a bill to increase the salary of the president of the United States to \$100,000 a year, and the salary of the vice president to \$25,000, is making a strong campaign for his measure. He said today that he believed it would be passed by both houses of congress shortly after the holiday recess.

He is lining up figures and statistics to fire at the opponents of the measure when the bill comes up for consideration.

Independent of all sentiment in the matter, declared the senator, "the man who is big enough to be chosen president of the United States is certainly as big as a railroad president, and should be paid, as a business proposition, what the responsibilities and demands of the position indicate would be a fair compensation."

SAYS HOP MAKES HUSBAND FORGET

Texas Man's Beautiful Wife Arrested in New York on Forgery Charge.

New York, Dec. 19.—Mrs. Marie Clapp, the young and handsome wife of Herbert Clapp, a former attorney of Philadelphia, was arrested before Magistrate Barlow today in the Jefferson Market court, charged with forgery. She had been arrested late Friday night in an apartment of the Prince George hotel, where she had arrived a few hours previously from San Antonio, Texas.

The arrest was made on the telegraphic complaint of H. G. Henna, county attorney of New Braunfels, Texas.

When Mrs. Clapp was arraigned she told a story that won for her sympathy and resulted in her being placed in the custody of the court's probation officer pending further instructions from the Texas authorities.

Mrs. Clapp told Magistrate Barlow that her husband, who she said was a drug victim, would after his escapades have not the slightest recollection of what had happened to her. She said she checked she is charged with having forged, the young woman said it had been given to her by Clapp, who drew and signed it in her presence, then giving it to her, he demanded that she take it and get out of Texas.

Mrs. Clapp said it was a matter of record that he had given her black eyes and threatened to kill her in New Braunfels.

WANTS TO MAKE THE NAVY OVER

Roosevelt Says If Root Will Boss the Job It Can Be Done.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Washington, Dec. 19.—President Roosevelt is seriously contemplating his plan for the appointment of a special commission to reorganize the navy department by eliminating the bureau system. He finds that the general board of the membership of the general board upon assuming his duties on December 1, and the appointment of Herbert I. Satterlee, the well known exponent of the president's naval theories, his assistant secretary of the navy, have failed short of effecting the reforms which the three men had in mind.

Because of what he considers to be the pressing necessity for reorganization, and undismayed by the intimation that congress will not pass any such measure before the conclusion of his term of office, President Roosevelt is again sounding leading naval experts with a view of securing their cooperation.

The president told several of his callers today that Secretary Root would accept the chairmanship of this committee, the success of his plan would be guaranteed.

NOT TOUCHING OHIO POLITICS

President Is Neither Knocking Nor Boosting in the Taft Case, He Says.

Washington, Dec. 19.—President Roosevelt has declared in a positive manner that there is absolutely no truth in the story that he has had any disagreement with Judge Taft about the candidacy of his brother, Charles P. Taft, for senator from Ohio. The president, it is learned from high sources, states that the subject of the Ohio senatorship has never been even remotely touched upon in conversations between himself and Taft, and he has no thought of in any manner interfering in the contest in that state.

The White House has been annoyed by reports of differences between the president and Taft, about the senatorship, and these reports have been further added to by stories that the president denies that there is any difference between him and Judge Taft on this question, and intimates that the president does not wish to be drawn into the Ohio senatorship fight, either by an expression of opinion as to whether Charles P. Taft should or should not have entered the race, in view of his relations with W. H. Taft, or as to whether Taft should or should not be elected senator over the other candidates.
