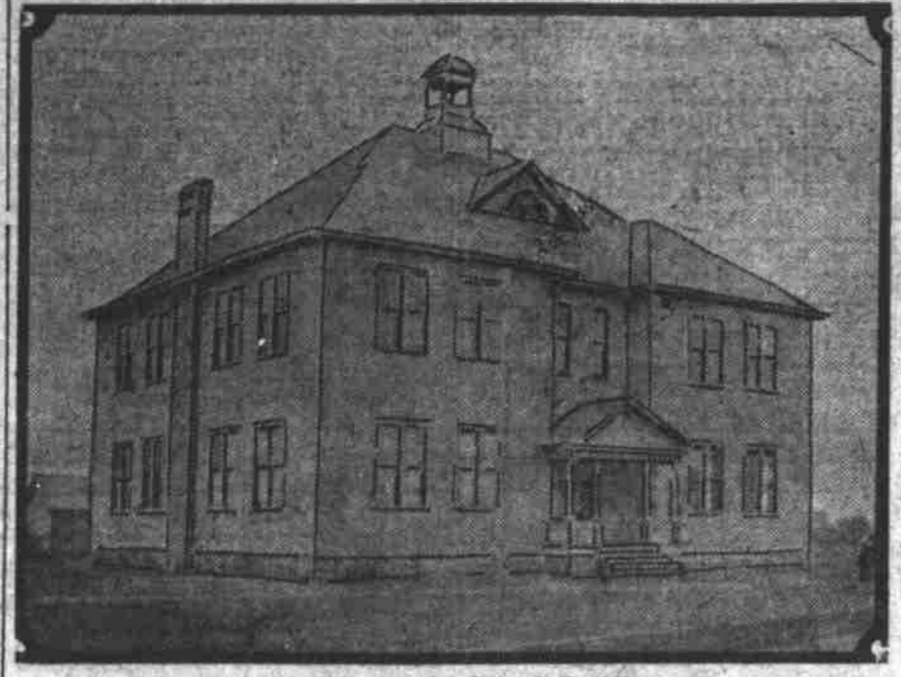


GOLDENDALE PEOPLE APPEAL TO COURT TO CLOSE SCHOOL

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Goldendale, Wash., Dec. 21.—At a mass meeting a truce was declared in the controversy over the fire escapes and heating apparatus of the new schoolhouse which has been agitating the citizens of Goldendale from the most prominent men down to the school children. The agitation started last week after the destruction of fire by a small dwelling just across the street from the schoolhouse. When the alarm was turned in it was thought to be the schoolhouse and everybody turned out to give aid to the children.

at the courthouse Wednesday night, December 17, it being understood that all legal proceedings will be dropped and that the directors will set on the report of the committee. The schoolhouse was built five years ago at a cost of about \$10,000 and was equipped with a furnace for heating purposes. This was found to be inadequate and stoves had to be installed on the upper floor. The agitation over danger from fire started after the conflagration at Colingwood, Ohio, last year when it brought out that the furnace was directly under the only stairway in the building.

FROST DELAYS CONCRETE WORK

Builders Unable to Continue Operations During the Cold Weather. Concrete mixing for the forms of the reinforced concrete building under construction throughout the city will probably be resumed tomorrow morning following a cessation of such work during the latter part of last week due to the freezing weather. The gravel and sand piles in front of the buildings are frozen solid, but the contractors expect that the higher temperatures will melt them out and permit the big concrete mixers to start up again.

CHARGE AGAINST SPENCER FAILS

Captain Charles R. Spencer, arrested by the federal authorities in August, for exceeding the speed limits on the river in violation of the government regulations, whose trial began in the United States district court Saturday, has been discharged by Judge Wolvenberg. The court held that the information of the prosecution was not sufficient. Judge Wolvenberg in making his decision said that it was quite evident that at different times the speed limits of the government on the river had been violated by the United States officials had simply done their duty in endeavoring to make a correction. The court gave a word of warning to the steamboat men and admonished them to be more careful in the future.

HOOD RIVER SCHOOLS ALMOST DEMORALIZED BY WHOOPING PUPILS

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Hood River, Or., Dec. 21.—Hood River children and many adults are suffering from whooping cough. In some instances entire families are whooping. The malady is said by the school teachers to have broken out among all of the pupils at the same time, and affected so many that it was useless to adopt the usual precaution of keeping those who had it at home. It is said that the coughing takes place in solos, duets, quartets and then in choruses, which calls for the suspension of recitations for the time being. No tests for tobacco have been reported. It is claimed that the disposition of the younger population of the city to have the whooping cough in unity is the natural tendency of Hood Riverites to whoop things up concertedly.

WEATHER REPORT

A low pressure area has made its appearance off the Washington coast, and another low pressure area is central north of Montana, while a third depression occupies the upper St. Lawrence valley. The high pressure area which has caused the cold weather in this district is slowly moving southward. During the last 12 hours rain has fallen along the coast from Cape Flattery to Coos bay and also in the sound country, and light snow has fallen in the Willamette valley. Rain has also occurred in the south Atlantic region and the northern portion of New England. It is warmer in Oregon, Washington and northern Idaho, but low temperatures continue in California, and frosts occurred this morning in that state as far south as Los Angeles.
