Chicago Becoming Banking Center of West Says J. P. Finley.

At the recent national mining congress held at Pittsburgh, Pa., J. P. Finley and E. A. Sessions of this city were delegates, appointed by Governor Chamberlain to represent Oregon.

The session of the congress was interesting and many able papers were read, although they dealt mainly with problems relating to coal mining, which is not of much importance to the Pacific coast as the mining of metals.

A matter which is of interest to the west was the appointing of a committee to confer with the national forestry department and obtain concessions in the cutting of necessary timber for construction work within the forest reserves.

The dedication of the old barracks at Pittsburgh as a national mining experiment station was another matter of interest. Here experiments will be conducted with a view to the prevention of accidents in mines, and also experiments with smoke consumers for coal-burning machinery.
