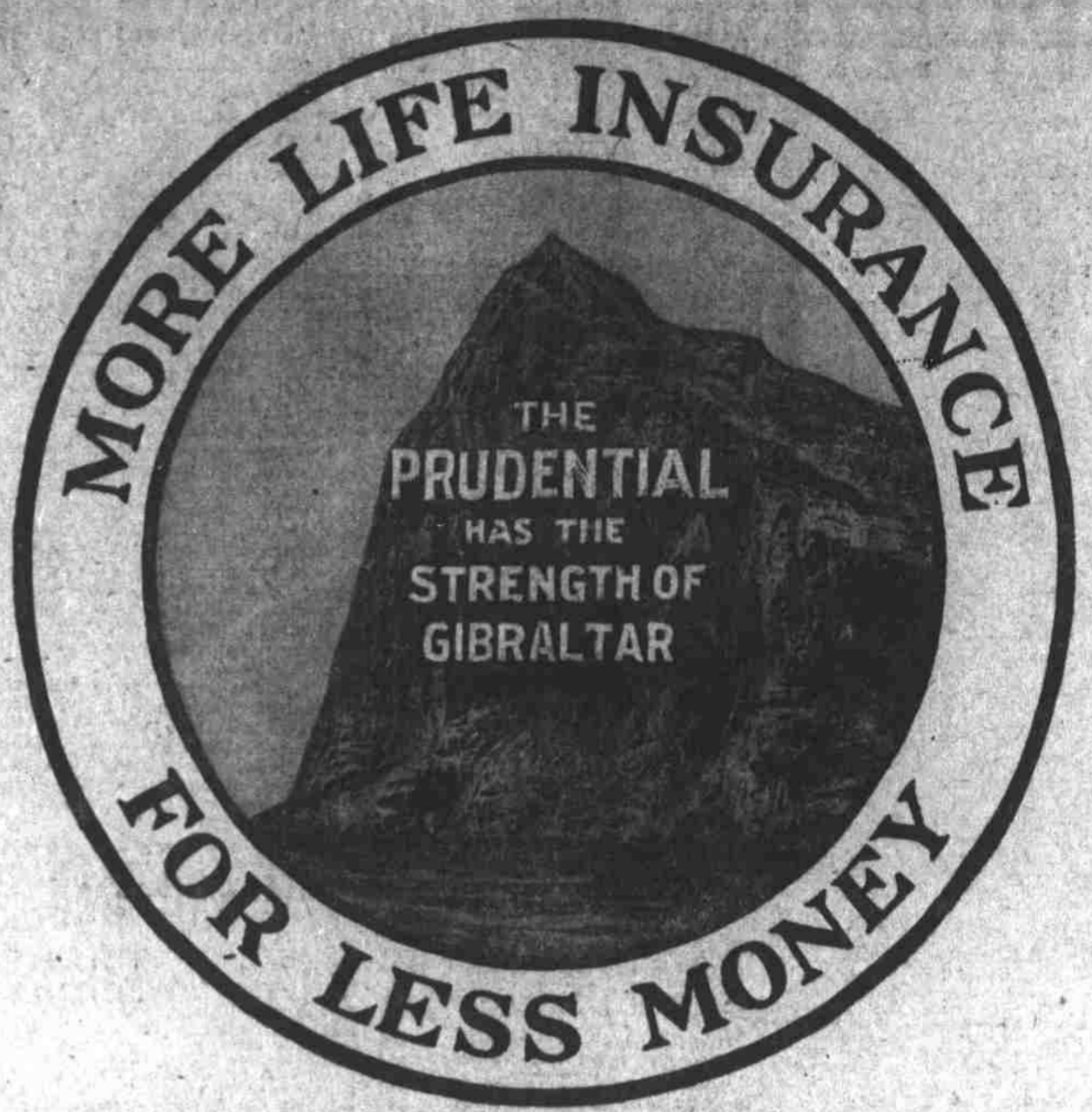

ITALY HONORS GREAT SALVINI

Eminent Tragedian 80 Years Old—Won Wealth in America.

Rome, Dec. 28.—That the Italians love their great men and never lose an opportunity of doing them honor is illustrated by the extensive preparations that have been made for the celebration tomorrow of the eighteenth birthday of Tommaso Salvini, Italy's greatest tragedian. In Rome and in other chief cities of the kingdom the anniversary will be observed with special performances in the theatres and with exercises under the auspices of literary and dramatic societies. Probably the most notable of the celebrations will be that held in Florence, where the great tragedian has made his home during the greater part of his life.

Tommaso Salvini is the oldest living great tragedian, and his name is a household word all over the world. It is not so long ago that he retired from the stage. He paid his farewell visit to the United States in 1890, and his Othello aroused all of the enthusiasm that he had created on the occasion of his American tour in 1886, when Edwin Booth interpreted Iago.

Salvini was born at Milan, January 1, 1828, and began to study for the stage at an early age. He made his debut when he was 14, under the direction of the celebrated actor, Gustavo Modena, and rose rapidly in his profession. Even then he was a fiery, impassioned actor, and the call to arms for Italian independence in 1849 found a ready response in the emotional young man.

MUST HARRIMAN WAIT FOR PAY?

Espece Attorneys Say Roosevelt Promised Reimbursement on Salton Sea.

Washington, Dec. 28.—Will the Southern Pacific company get \$1,500,000 from the treasury of the United States in return for the money expended in closing the break in the runaway Colorado river in the latter part of 1906 and the beginning of 1907? This is a question that is being considered by the United States government, and the Southern Pacific company, and Senator Frank Harrison of California, author of a senate bill allowing such an amount to the railroad.

MAIDS ON DAIRY PROVE FAILURE

Looked Fine in White Overalls and Jumpers; but That Wasn't All.

North Yakima, Wash., Dec. 28.—The plan of running a model dairy with milkmaids instead of men, which was tried by Mrs. Frank Ridkin on her ranch a few miles south of this city has proved a failure. It was thought that having maids in white overalls and jumpers would be a great drawing card, and it did attract much attention, but several things arose which the management had not foreseen. Fine dormitories were prepared for the girls, but they wanted to sleep alone, and the request was granted. One of them wanted to marry the stable boy and her request was also granted.

ESCAPING GAS CAUSE OF TWO DEATHS

San Francisco, Dec. 28.—Escaping gas caused the death of Otto Willweder, proprietor of Saratoga hall, and Frank Carlson, a concrete worker. Gas was pouring from a jet. Carlson was asphyxiated in his room while sitting near a heater from which a pipe had become disconnected, allowing gas to escape.
