

STORMY WEATHER ON EASTERN RIVER

French Bark La Tour de Auvergne Anchors in the Harbor. SPEAKS WHEAT LADEN BARK FROM PORTLAND

Captain Reports Heavy Sea for Weeks at a Time but Vessel Completes Long Voyage From Hamburg via Hobart in Good Time.

An unusually stormy but speedy voyage is reported by the French bark La Tour de Auvergne, which arrived in the harbor this morning from Hamburg by way of Bremen and Hamburg.

The La Tour de Auvergne brought 900 barrels of chain brand cement consigned to Kerr, Gifford & Co. It was only half a cargo but served to ballast the craft.

WITH THE TRAMP STEAMERS
