## VERY HEAVY CATCH OF STEELHEAD SALMON

**TODAY'S WHOLESALE MARKETS.** Turkeys fractionally easier. Chicken markets very firm. Eggs are rather easy. Dressed hogs come more freely. Demand for salmon is heavy. Only best butter is firm. Cheese moving to the north. Wheat quiet, but there is only a limited amount of stock.

**Easier Tone in Turkeys.** Although select dressed turkeys are still bringing as high as 25c a pound in the front street markets today the demand is not quite so pronounced as it was a day or so ago. The trade seems to have received its requirements and is not overstocked with the commodity. There has been a disposition among buyers to grade stock more carefully than in the past. Turkeys that are not top quality are still selling at a price of 22c to 24c while some ordinary dressed stock is moving around 20c, the same price as for select live stock.

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**Only Best Butter Is Firm.** Firmness continues to rule in the demand for best known brands of creamery. Supplies of this grade are in many places smaller than the demand and therefore for that reason alone prices are being held very firm. Outside markets are showing a tendency to be lower, but the demand is still strong. Some of the better brands are still selling at 22c to 24c, while some ordinary brands are selling at 18c to 20c.

**Weakening Tone in Eggs.** There continues to be shown a weakening tone in the local egg market. Arrivals of ranch stock are increasing and some sales have been made during the 24 hours around \$7.50 a dozen, though some dealers still inclined to sell at 38c to 39c. Few sales, however, are being made above 38c. Eastern eggs are showing considerable weakness and are other decline of 1 to 2c a dozen is reported. Dealers who were asking as high as 42c to 43c today and are very anxious to clean up at that figure. The fact that the market is showing a weakening tone is unusually good in all that saves values in that line from breaking in two.

**Dressed Hogs Come More Freely.** Arrivals of dressed hogs in the front street markets during the past 24 hours were somewhat more liberal. Demand, however, was even better and supplies were quite easily cleaned up with best stock ranging around 8 1/2 to 9c a pound. Dressed veal continues very scarce with price high but unchanged from yesterday.

**Brief Notes of Wholesale Trade.** Lined oil, both raw and boiled, is at a low level. Higher prices are expected to rule with the decreased offerings. Cranberry market is firm with small holdings here. Potatoes and onions are both quiet. Trade steady, however. Street sales at the following prices. Those paid shippers are less regular commissions:
