HARRY ALDRICH
CUT WITH RAZORWilliam Holmes, Colored,
Alleged to Have Made
Unprovoked Attack.

Vancouver, Wash., Jan. 1.—Harry Aldrich is at the military hospital with a gash in his abdomen, made with a razor. It is said, while engaged in an altercation with William Holmes, colored. Aldrich's injury is believed to be serious and his assailant will be held until the outcome is known.

When he went out and asked Holmes what he wanted the latter replied in an insulting manner and when Aldrich ordered the colored man to move on he whipped out a razor and began to slash at Aldrich, inflicting one bad wound in the abdomen.
