CELTIC SUPPLIES SENT TO MESSINA INSTEAD OF FLEET

New York, Jan. 1.—Commander Huse of the navy supply ship Celtic received orders today to proceed at full speed at 9 o'clock this afternoon for Messina.

The Celtic has on board 6000 tons of fresh beef and mutton and poultry, with medicines and clothing. The supplies were intended for the sinking of the Atlantic fleet and the Celtic was to have met the American ships at Gibraltar to deliver them. The entire cargo will be placed at the disposal of the officials in charge of the relief work in the earthquake district.

Washington, Dec. 31.—The United States gunboat Scorpion, now at Constantinople, was ordered today to proceed immediately to Messina.

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GOVERNOR GILLETTE CALLS ON STATE TO CONTRIBUTE RELIEF

Sacramento, Cal., Jan. 1.—Governor Gillette today issued the following proclamation calling for financial aid to the Italians in the stricken earthquake districts.

"To the citizens of California: The world today stands appalled at the great loss of life and the suffering caused by the recent earthquake in southern Italy. By reason thereof great distress prevails there among the people and it is the duty of this state to extend to them proper clothing and aid in the way of immediate assistance.

ARCHBISHOP RIORDAN CALLS ON CHURCHES TO HELP ITALIANS

Sacramento, Cal., Jan. 1.—Archbishop Riordan has set aside Sunday, January 10, as a special time for the collection of money by the parishes of his diocese for the relief of the stricken people of southern Italy.

In a call issued today the archbishop asks the various congregations to contribute to the relief fund. He asks that the money be sent to the archbishop of Palermo immediately after the same.

"Mindful," says the archbishop in his call, "of the suffering of the Italian people and of the spontaneous sympathy and generous assistance which promptly poured in upon us from every where, we surely cannot now be without sympathy and turn unfeeling hearts to these Italian sufferers. Let human sympathy be kindled in every Christian heart and let our people to do unto these others in their day of visitation as others have, in our day, done unto us."

REGGIO SURVIVORS ARE INSANE FROM HORROR

Reggio, Italy, Jan. 1.—Survivors of the earthquake in Reggio are suffering from mental derangement. Children and women were trampled and fatally injured.

Many hundreds of earthquake survivors are ill from exposure at Messina. The survivors are without shelter and are being removed from the city many will die.

The American embassy here was notified early today that the gunboat Scorpion left Constantinople today for Messina to participate in the relief work.

TWO PRIESTS DECLARE ONLY THEY LIVE, OF 5,000 OF SCILLIA

Scyllia, Italy, Jan. 1.—Two priests from Scyllia, a town of 5,000 inhabitants on the Calabrian coast of the Strait of Messina, arrived here today and reported that only they and a few survivors of the entire population of the city.

The tidal waves engulfed the city of Scyllia and were swept out to sea, said one of the priests. "The great wave came soon after the earthquake shocks. The entire cargo will be placed at the disposal of the officials in charge of the relief work in the earthquake district."

"After we had drifted about for hours on the wreckage, we were picked up by a small boat. We were taken to Messina, where we saw the most horrible destruction and death. Messina exists no longer. The survivors are without shelter and are being removed from the city many will die."

"Every city on the west coast of Calabria has been destroyed. The extent of the loss of property and life is beyond imagination. Urgent calls have been sent out for reinforcements to handle the thousands of wounded refugees and the penniless, homeless victims who are arriving by the thousands."

Soldiers here have turned bakers, and the whole city is given over to the task of feeding the hungry. Medical supplies are in great demand.

WARSHIPS FIRE SHELLS TO STOP MESSINA FLAMES

Catania, Jan. 1.—Warships off Messina are bombarding the burning sections of the city as the only possible means of fighting the flames, which have been spreading in spite of all efforts to check them.

Later refugees from Messina today told of the horrors of the earthquake in the city. They say the desolation is complete and that starvation and pestilence are in the path of the earthquake and fire.

CONSUL BISHOP IS AMONG THE DEAD

Rome, Jan. 1.—The American embassy officials are convinced that Consul Bishop of Palermo, who was reported to have been away from Sicily at the time of the earthquake, was in the devastated island when the disaster occurred and is probably dead.

Major Reynolds, military attaché; Bayard Cutting, jr., vice consul at Milan, and Winthrop Chandler of Palermo, military attaché, are to depart, were sent to the earthquake region today by Ambassador Griscom.

ELKS SEND \$10,000 TO AID ITALIANS

Wheeling, W. Va., Jan. 1.—Mayor Schmitt, grand trustee of the order of Elks, today announced a donation by the order of \$10,000 from the charity fund to be cabled to the Italian Red Cross.

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Rome, Jan. 1.—Ten thousand soldiers have been ordered to the scene of the earthquake in Italy. The troops are to reinforce the troops already on duty in the stricken provinces.

Doctors Come From Malta. Messina, Jan. 1.—Twelve British naval doctors have arrived here bringing all the medical supplies they could collect at Malta.
