

WILL BRING TO JUSTICE

First Sunday After Epiphany Day of Offering in Episcopal Churches.

Bishop Charles Scadding has communicated with the rectors of the Episcopal churches of the Oregon diocese, authorizing them to receive offerings on the first Sunday after Epiphany for the sufferers in Italy, and instructing them to have the members of the church to offer prayers to God for mercy on the suffering people of Italy in the letter sent to Episcopal ministers and the prayer to be offered.

The following special prayer has been authorized by Bishop Scadding to be used in all the Episcopal churches in the diocese of Oregon and in private devotions during January 1909.

Resolved: That the following amendment to the constitution of the State of Oregon be adopted.

Section 11, Rights of Accused in Criminal Prosecutions.—In all criminal prosecutions the accused shall have the right to public trial by an impartial jury in the county in which the offense shall have been committed.

Section 12, Trial by Jury in Civil Cases.—In all civil cases the right of trial by jury shall remain inviolate, but in cases where the amount in controversy between the parties as shown by the pleadings does not exceed \$2000 the court may, in its discretion, try the case without a jury.

Section 13, Witnesses for Night Riders Repudiates Story Told Under Threats.

Mr. Morris voluntarily went upon the witness stand today in the trial of the eight men alleged to have lynched Captain Quentin Rankin during the recent night rider raids and declared that her testimony yesterday was given under threats.

Mr. Morris declared yesterday that on the night of the hanging of Rankin, her husband was in the company of Tom Clear, who confessed participation in the attacks. Besides Mrs. Morris, John Reid and Charles Brown were under indictment for the murder of Rankin, contradicted the testimony of Judge Linn in an indictment charging that he was at home on the night of the killing of Rankin.

Stolen Goods Again Stolen. A dozen razors and 40 pocket knives, stolen in Seio, Or., is said by the police, were placed in the printing shop again by two young men who knew how the goods came to be there.

Names of the Men Graham Has Signed. The neighborhood in Seio is being harassed by the detectives who have told Detective Hellyer and Moloney they know that inside were the razors and knives stolen in Seio. Brown has since been arrested at Seio.
